Elizabeth Hoyt, at dinner at her home. These officers were all guests of the Highwood Group that evening.

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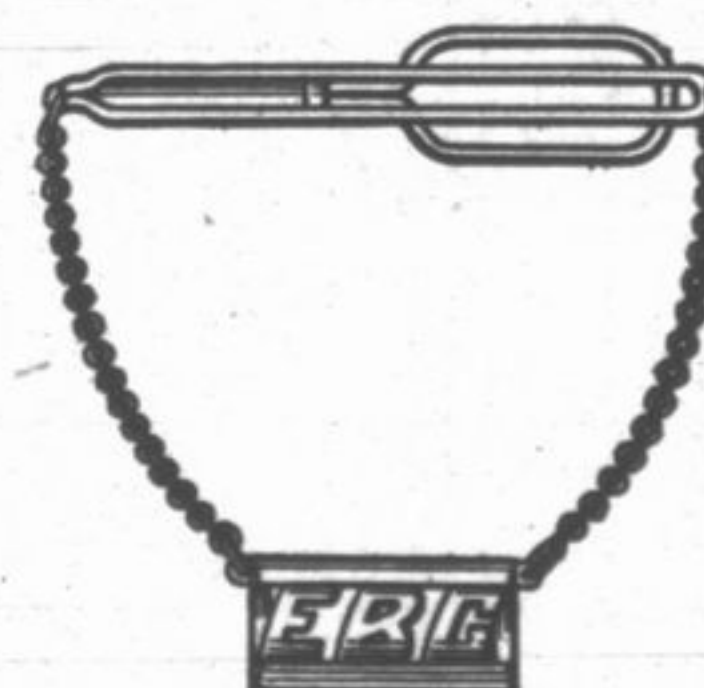
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
