

### Highwood Fireman Suffers Broken Vertebra in Fall

Carrodo Giangiorgi, 29, a Highwood fireman, was seriously injured Sunday evening when he fell 40 feet while fighting a fire on the roof of a dwelling at 11 North avenue, Highwood.

Giangiorgi who sustained a fractured vertebra in the accident, according to his physician, is resting comfortably at the Highland Park hospital where he is a patient. He resides on Lake View avenue, in Highwood.

The residence which is a two story frame structure, is owned by Silvio Torri. Damage was estimated at about \$500. The roof, attic and interior of the second floor was gutted. It is believed that a defective fue was the cause of the fire. The Highland Park fire department also responded to the call.
