Two manslaughter indictments were returned by the Lake countty jury Monday at Waukegan against Harry Momberg, 26 years old, 424 South First street, Rockford. On Thanksgiving day his car crashed into another car on West Central avenue causing the death of Arthur Orsi, 27 years old, 1200 Deerfield road, in the suburb, and Orsi's wife, Lucille, 25 years old, who were in the second automobile.

At an inquest into the deaths, held last Saturday in this city, he was charged with manslaughter on a warrant issued by Justice of the Peace Richard Martin. The jury recommended that he be held for grand jury action.
