 Community Carefully Canvassed
 In the selection of the 45 trustees the entire community has been most carefully and diligently canvassed in order that the complete group finally chosen should fully represent the community in every respect; location, race, color and creed. Naturally a truly representative board of trustees will more closely cement relationship between the hospital and the community with consequent benefit to both.

Under the by-laws of the foundation the personnel is to consist of 45 trustees, who agree to serve for a period of at least one year. At the end of each year 15 new trustees are elected; 15 past trustees retiring. By this means it is hoped to give the community maximum representation over a period of years. Residence of long tenure in Highland Park will share alike with those more recently adopting Highland Park as their home.

"Foundation" Not a New Idea
 The change in administrative form from association to foundation has been under consideration by the board for a number of years. The

members of the association have sought various ways and means of making the hospital a more integral part of community life. Careful consideration, consultation and correspondence with other like organizations indicated the "foundation" form of corporate structure as the best for the furtherance of objectives. Experience in similar institutions and under comparable circumstances revealed that a broadening of responsibility over a greater part of the community served has brought forth immeasurably greater results. It is felt that such will be the case with respect to our fine hospital organization. Hence the creation of this new form of the old and original idea as conceived at the outset, more than 19 years ago. The technical staff, personnel and equipment of the hospital will remain unchanged.—Contributed.

Figures have just been received from the Illinois Tuberculosis Association showing the receipt from the Christmas Seal Sale in 31 counties in Illinois through December 15, 1937. There has been an increase in all but four of these counties. Lake County is one of the four and shows the largest decrease. This can only mean one thing, that Lake county will have to cut its program while other counties are making a decided progress the coming year, unless we can still raise the necessary amount.

New Magazine Not for Financial Gain; to Improve Affairs

Rising Tide, the new pictorial, made its appearance on the news stands throughout United States and Canada December 14. Printed in nine languages and ten countries, this publication is international in coverage as well as content and is unique in many respects. It carries no advertising and expects to make no profit. As the editors say "it is published not to make dollars but to remake nations." The staff is composed of volunteers from the business and professional world, new to pictorial journalism and working without pay.

Rising Tide shows in pictures the news of an answer to personal problems and world unrest and the publishers feel that it is a constructive presentation of positive news in every day events in the lives of a rising tide of new men and the new women.

Some of the foreign editions are already on sale abroad. In England ten members of the British Parliament sent a copy of Rising Tide

with a letter to each of their colleagues in the House of Commons. The leader in the Busmen's strike which held up London during the Coronation has sent a copy to each of the delegates of the Busmen's Union which represents thirty-five thousand men. The President of Finland sent a copy of the Finnish edition to every member of his Parliament with a personal letter. In Holland the Dutch Foreign Minister, Dr. J. A. N. Patijn, sent a copy of the Dutch edition with a personal letter to all the members of the Dutch Parliament.

The American edition, with a first printing of 800,000 is claimed to be the largest first run of any publication on sale on the news stands. The financial backing of Rising Tide has been furnished by all types of people, from truck driver and factory worker to office worker and businessman, who have gladly dug down into their pockets to carry the initial expenses of publication. The editors have expressed the hope that this publication will serve as a rallying point for the constructive forces in the country.
