Fire Department Answers 271 Calls During Past Year

Averaging about five calls a week, the Highland Park fire department responded to 271 alarms during the year 1937. Out of these responses, 240 were to fires, four of which were out of town calls, and eight were false alarms.

The total value of the property involved in the fires amounted to \$1,835,925, while the total fire loss was \$39,857.50. The insurance total was \$1,334,200 with a loss of \$30,857.50.

The balance of the thirty one calls were for cats caught in trees, children locked in rooms, grass fires, or other minor incidents. Three inhalator cases were handled by the

department, and all three persons were revived.
