

McKinlock Claim Largest Entered In Lake County

The largest claim ever entered in Lake county is that filed against the estate of George Alexander McKinlock, Lake Bluff philanthropist and manufacturer, in the Probate court of Waukegan Monday—for \$1,093,625. Mr. McKinlock died in December, 1936.

The plaintiff in the recovery suit is the New England Mutual Life Insurance company of Boston, Mass. The company states that Mr. McKinlock arranged two loans from the company, one for \$390,000 and the other for \$660,000—a total of \$1,050,000. To this is added interest of \$53,625 up to Nov. 1, 1937, for the grand total.

The loans were secured by two pieces of property in the Loop—the McKinlock building at 209 West Jackson street and the other designated as "elsewhere."

Denis E. Sullivan Jr., attorney for the estate, said that the claim will be confessed, but that the "full amount cannot be paid." Sullivan indicated that due to prior claims, the net value of the estate may be insufficient to cover the loans in their entirety.

The value of the estate as given in the final approved inventory last September was \$1,577,500. Of this, \$513,000 was in cash and securities. The rest was real estate.

The recovery suit came as further indication of a decline in Mr. McKinlock's estate. On Nov. 18, Northwestern university announced it was changing the name of its downtown campus from McKinlock to the Chicago campus, and returning \$155,717 previously received from Mr. McKinlock. The campus was named in honor of his son, Lieut. George A. McKinlock Jr., naval aviator killed in action in France, with Mr. McKinlock pledging \$250,000 to the university. Circumstances beyond Mr. McKinlock's control made it impossible for him to meet the pledge, and so the university canceled it and returned the money already received.

Building and Health Fees For 1937 Total \$3,353.97

Building and license fees in Lake Forest for 1937 brought in a revenue of \$3,353.97, it was reported this week. Fifty-four permits with a total valuation of \$367,964.85, and 105 for alterations. Fees for these amounted to \$2,316.97.

There were 73 plumbing permits, 12 sewer permits, 49 for oil burners, 23 for storage tanks and 86 for street openings, increasing the revenues from these sources to \$2,963.97.

Licenses issued included 36 for milk, 6 for ice and 5 for garbage, totalling \$390.00.

One hundred and eighty-eight cases of diseases were reported—12 of scarlet fever, 101 chickenpox, 3 whooping cough, 10 measles, 1 tubercular meningitis, 1 tuberculosis, 6 pneumonia, 1 typhoid fever, 1 syphilis. Also included in this list were 52 treatments for dog bites.

Sanitation conditions throughout the city were pronounced good by W. O. Pasape, building and health commissioner.
