Music—Art and Travel is the motto of the Beaux Arts Salon, and it is the motive of Mile. Ernestine, who is America's youngest international-impressario, and who is a Chicagoan, to help the younger generation in music and art.

The Beaux Arts Salon was inaugurated by Mile. Ernestine in 1934 in Paris, France, at The Claridge on the Champs Elysees. These Franco-American concerts were presented to bring good-will between the French and American artists and citizens living in the French capital. In Chicago, the music and art of democratic European nations is presented to bring closer friendship and understanding through these continental concerts.

Isidor Philipp has said of these two young duo-pianists: "Mr. and Mrs. Roger Balke, who have worked under my direction, are both excellent musicians and pianists and able instructors whom I recommend highly. Both have plumbed the depths of their art with patience and alert intelligence." Mrs. Balke was one of the foremost of the young pianists of Switzerland. She is a graduate of the Conservatory of Basel, where she studied under Felix Weingartner. Later Rudolf Serkin and Isidor Philipp were her pedagogues.

"Very keen, conscientious and intelligent, with finely developed fingers and capable of much delight in tone coloring," was the Music News comment on their playing since their return.

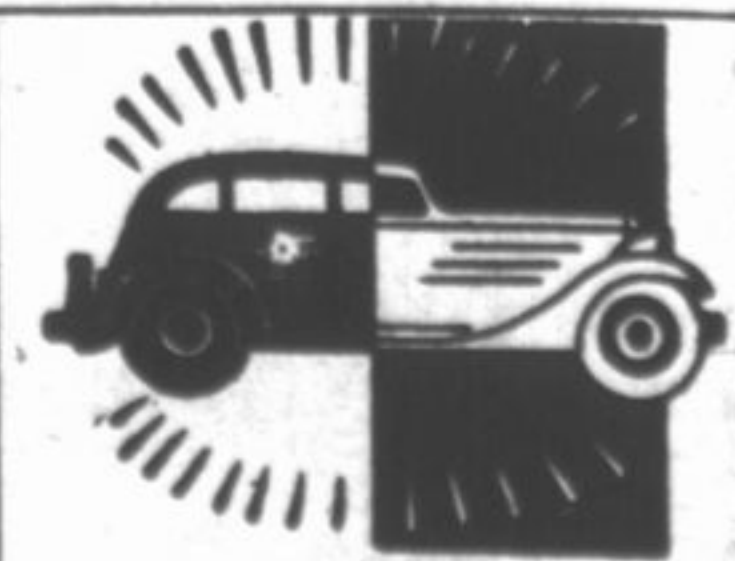
**Phil Johnsons Back From European Trip**
