

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING PARK-ING ON WAUKEGAN ROAD BETWEEN OSTERMAN AVENUE AND ORCHARD STREET IN THE VILLAGE OF DEER-PIELD, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUTEES OF THE VIL-LAGE OF DEERFIELD: SECTION 1. That on Waukegan Road between Osterman Avenue and Orchard

Street no motor vehicle shall be parked with the left side of such vehicle next to the curb, and it shall be unlawful to stand or park any vehicle within the above described limits other than parallel with the curb and with the right wheels of the vehicle within twelve inches of the regularly established curb line.
