Humphreys or "Jack' as he prefers to be called, vice-president of the Seeing Eye and division of training and research, explained the origin and described the preparation required to accomplish the work. Three steps are necessary in preparing a dog for the duty of "Seeing Eye." First a trainer must be secured with the right temperment and nerve reaction to qualify for the position of dog trainer. He must "go blind" in order that he may react to the feeling of a blind man. When this is successfully completed the dogs are then trained. Not every dog will react to the training any more than every man will qualify as a trainer. When the dog proves his efficiency, the blind person is then taught. From four to six weeks training is required by


