

To Report Gift Of \$3625 From Chest Funds To Infant Welfare

Mrs. Webster Stafford will represent Highland Park-Ravinia center of the Infant Welfare Society of Chicago at the annual meeting of the society to be held Wednesday, February 2, in the Stevens hotel. Highland Park Community Chest contributes to the work of the society at its Alice H. Wood station through this local group, and everyone who has made a contribution to the Chest is invited to attend the meeting. Reservations should be sent either to Mrs. Stafford or direct to the society at 203 North Wabash avenue not later than Saturday, January 29.

Mrs. Stafford will report a gift of \$3,625 in 1937, which provided doctors, nurses, nutritionists and mental hygiene guidance for 1,776 expectant mothers and children in the Alice H. Wood station area. In addition, the members of these two groups of women gave 510 hours of volunteer service at the station which released the nurses for service which they only can perform, and they made 1,319 articles of wearing apparel for the babies.

The meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the society will be held at 10:30 a.m. in the North ball room of the hotel, followed by the annual meeting of the whole society at luncheon at 12:30 p.m. in the Boulevard room, Philip D. Armour presiding, at which reports will be given of the activities of the society in 1937. The guest speaker will be Edward L. Ryerson, Jr.

Scenes in Chicago's own great picture, include such famous landmarks as Field, Leiter & Co.; the old Palmer House; the Adams Express Co. building; the City hall and county building of that time; the A & P telegraph building and the 19th Regiment Armory.
