The League of Women Voters, participating this January in the thirty-second annual observance of Child Labor Day, challenged the citizenship of Illinois to make every possible effort to end an evil against which campaigns have been waged for decades.

Since too few state legislatures are in session this year to make possible completing the ratification of the Child Labor Amendment, which Illinois has ratified and which would cover the whole problem, the League is calling on Congress to enact pending legislation

which would at least eliminate child labor in goods passing in interstate commerce, affecting about one-fourth of the children now working.

League officials declared themselves in favor of a federal child labor bill modeled after the first child labor law which was administered by the federal Children's Bureau in cooperation with the states. This law was declared unconstitutional by the Supreme Court about twenty years ago. As in many other fields of social legislation, however, public and legal opinion has advanced in the past two decades, and decisions of the Supreme Court last spring, especially those upholding the Wagner Labor Relations Act and the Social Security Act, have given some reason for hope that a federal child labor law might also be upheld.

The League of Women Voters voiced strong opposition to the child labor provisions of the Wheeler Johnson bill, passed by the Senate in the special session, which would regulate child labor by the "prison-made principle" of declaring contraband goods made by child labor.
