The three major addresses will be delivered by such eminent and public spirited citizens as the Hon. Jeanette Rankin, Mrs. Arthur Williams, and Dr. Preston Bradley. The latter needs no introduction. He is known throughout this country and abroad for his humanitarian activities, and his fearlessness in the pulpit. The attendance at his Sunday morning services is unequalled by any other religious group.

Mrs. Arthur Williams of Normal, Illinois, was formerly a resident of Highland Park. Her friends will be glad to welcome her back, for they remember her gracious, yet dynamic personality. She participated in all commercial affairs, but was particularly interested in the schools. This interest led her into the office of president of the Illinois Congress of Parents and Teachers, which she has held for the past four years.

Miss Jeanette Rankin is journeying from Washington to contribute her share toward further enlightening the public on the possibilities of preserving the peace.

**Free Mombert Of Manslaughter Charge**

A jury in the Lake county Circuit court of Judge Ralph J. Dady at Waukegan last night found Harry Mombert, 26 years old, of Rockford, not guilty of manslaughter.

Mombert was the driver of an automobile that collided with another in Highland Park on Nov. 25. Arthur Orsi and his wife, Lucille, of 1200 Deerfield road, Highland Park, were killed. Policemen testified that Mombert was intoxicated, and two physicians upheld this diagnosis. Mombert claimed he had drunk only two glasses of beer and that he was not at fault in the collision.

He had been tried previously on a manslaughter charge in connection with Orsi's death, the case resulting in disagreement. The trial yesterday was on the charge of killing Mrs. Orsi.
