Edward Zimmer, Old H. P. Resident Dies: Funeral Held Tuesday

Edward Zimmer, 70, well known jobbing contractor in Highland Park for many years, passed away Saturday, Feb. 19, at the Highland Park hospital where he had undergone an operation two weeks ago, and was apparently on the road to recovery. Complications developed Wednesday, which resulted in

his death the following Saturday. He was born in Wheeling, Dec. 14, 1867, tht son of Conrad and Magdaline Zimmer. His early boyhood was spent in his parental home in Wheeling where he also received his early education. At the age of 14 he came to Highland Park and made his home with his sister Miss Mary Zimmer. Soon after coming to Highland Park he sought employment and worked in various places. At the age of 17 he associated himself with his brother Julius (now deceased) and his nephew, Edward Huber, and learned

the building trade. Mr. Zimmer was known in the community as an excellent workman. Many people employed himbecause they knew that their work, would be well done. He was a very energetic man, and seldom took time for leisure or recreation. He was always anxious to complete the task that engaged him so that he might pass on to the next job that was waiting for him. Mr. Zimer was very u npretentious, quiet and unassuming and spent much of his time about his home.

On Nov. 10, 1891, Mr. Zimmer united in marriage with Miss Edith Cole of this city. There were three children born to them, all of whom are living. They are Winifield B. and Harvey Cole Zimmer and Mrs. Elmer R. Evans, all residents of this city. Mrs. Zimmer preceded her husband in death on Aug. 12,

During the past ten years Mr. Zimmer's health was impaired seriously a number of times, but in each instance through sheer will power and persistence he heroically fought his way back, and again resumed his work.

The deceased is survived by three grandchildren besides his two sons and daughter, and other relatives an many friends.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Kelly chapel, with Rev. H. F. Siemsen of Bethany church officiating. Interment took place at Park Ridge cemetery.
