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**29 Open Campaign Primary April 12 For County Offices**

Twenty-nine candidates, 16 Republicans and 13 Democrats, officially opened their campaigns on Washington's birthday for the sev-

made by each party at the primary elections. Of the 29 candidates in the field, 15 are campaigning for county nominations for the first time.

When the county clerk's office was closed at 5 p.m., the deadline for filing nominating petitions, three Republican candidates who are seeking re-election were without party competition, as were two Democratic candidates.

All other Republican and Democratic races for county offices had two or more candidates.

In the republican ranks the contests for sheriff, probate clerk, county clerk and county treasurer offer an unusual array of capable candidates. To succeed Sheriff L. A. Doolittle, who cannot be a candidate for re-election, Chief Deputy Sheriff Thomas E. Kennedy, John E. Froelich and Harold E. Pillifant will stage an interesting and aggressive campaign.

With Probate Clerk John R. Bullock retiring at the end of his current term of office because of his health, the field for that job is wide open.

For the Republican nomination for county clerk the four candidates have had varied experience as political workers and office holders. The candidates in the order of filing are Jay B. Morse of Libertyville, former county treasurer and one-time deputy county clerk; William J. Stratton of Ingleside, former secretary of state; Lew A. Hendee, of Waukegan, former county clerk, and J. Russell Miller of Shields township, a newcomer in county politics.

In the campaign for county treasurer the Republicans have Garfield Leaf of Waukegan, deputy treasurer and cashier who is a first time county candidate, and Robert J. Greenslade of Highland Park, a city commissioner and first time county office aspirant.

County Judge Perry L. Persons, Probate Judge Martin C. Decker and Superintendent of Schools W. C. Petty are unopposed.

For the Democratic primary the party fight for county leadership came out in the open with the organization of a complete slate by Attorney Jack Bairstow's newly organized Civic Democratic league of Lake county. To oppose the civic leaguers, the party "regulars" headed by Chairman R. R. Bosworth of the central committee scurried about for acceptable candidates.

Following the lead taken in a

downstate county by an election of a Republican woman county judge, the Democratic civic leaguers chose as their candidates for county judge a young Highland Park woman lawyer, Mrs. Esther C. Singer. Opposing her is Robert P. Sullivan of Prairie View, a lawyer practicing in Chicago.

In the sheriff's race Sgt. Bart Tyrrell of the Waukegan police department has the civic league label. Opposing him is Lt. Charles A. Stanton of Ingleside, in charge of the state highway police.

The Democratic campaign for probate clerk has three candidates, probate judge two candidates and superintendent of schools two candidates in T. Arthur Simpson of Benton township, former Republican officeholder for 24 years, who has the civic league endorsement, and Charles Noll of Waukegan, present assistant attorney general in charge of state inheritance tax returns in Lake county.

County Clerk Russ Alford for re-election and James McMillen of Antioch, the professional wrestler, for county treasurer, are unopposed.

**Evanston Festival Secured 9 World Famous Artists**

The Evanston May Music Festival programs just announced by Musical Director Frederick Stock calls for nine world famous guest artists, the Festival Chorus, Children's Chorus and the Northwestern A Capella Choir in addition to the Chicago Symphony Orchestra which will play at all four performances.

The twenty-sixth annual north shore festival, revived last year by Edwin S. Mills and associates on the Northwestern University Festi-



val Association, will consist this year of four gala concerts to be played in the University Gymnasium on the evenings of May 17-19 and 21 with a Children's Festival on the afternoon of the 21st. Under the direction of veteran Conductor Frederick Stock, Associate Director Hans Lange and Dean John W. Beattie of the University School of Music, the festival will again assume its previous pre-eminence among the world's spring musical festivals, allowed to lapse for a period of four years following the death of its founder, Dean Peter C. Lutkin.

The list of famed soloists calls for eight vocalists and one instrumentalist. Seven of the artists are announced at this time; Hans Lange is now in New York holding

auditions for the narrator and Dr. Stock is considering the instrumentalist who will appear on the children's matinee. Those named to date include Bruna Castagna, contralto; Richard Crooks, tenor; Agnes Davis, soprano; Julius Huehn, baritone; Helen Jepson, soprano; Giovanni Martinelli, tenor, and William Miller, tenor.

As designed by Dr. Stock, the festival will open on the evening of May 17 with a performance of Arthur Honegger's famed choral work, "King David." Assisting artists at this concert will be Madame Castagna, Miss Agnes Davis and William Miller with the narrator not yet known.

The second program, to be played Thursday, May 19, will consist of Brahms' Requiem, sung by the Festival Chorus with Agnes Davis, Richard Crooks and Julius Huehn. A choral and instrumental program is designed for the Saturday afternoon children's concert in which some 1500 school children from north shore schools will take part.

Saturday night is the "Gala Concert" night, according to Dr. Stock. On this program, made up of famous operatic arias, will ap-

pear Giovanni Martinelli and Julius Huehn. The Woman's Committee which did much to revive the festival and make it a success last season, is now in process of organization and the course subscription sale will open about March 1 in the Association offices in the Georgian hotel, Evanston.
