

Local Council Of Scouts Rates High In Activity

The National Council, Boy Scouts of America, has just issued their figures comparing each of the 534 Councils of the nation with all other Councils in what is known as the "Index of Accomplishment." This measuring rod describes the status as of December 31, 1937.

The different items of this Index when put together, fairly accurately describes the status of the Council in most of the important phases of its work. The highest index possible is 100.

The North Shore Area Council as will be seen from the following figures, rates high among the Councils of the nation. The figures are for:

Table with 2 columns: Item and Index. Items include Scout Density, Troop Density, Net dropped Scouts, Recruiting, Tenderfoot, Total Class, Attainment, Net dropped Troops, Combined Troop & Pack Density, Combined Cub & Scout Density.

The interpretation of the above is that of 534 Councils in the U.S.A. there are only 2 per cent or 11 of them who had as of Dec. 31, 1937, more Scouts per population than the North Shore Area Council; that only 2 per cent or 11 Councils did a better job of holding and reregistering their Scouts than the North Shore Area Council; that only 4 per cent or 22 Councils were more efficient in recruiting or enrolling Scouts during the year than the North Shore Area Council and that only 1 per cent or 6 Councils of 534 have a higher membership of both Cubs and Scouts per population than this local Council.

Even though these figures reveal great strength in the North Shore Area Council, officers of this powerful organization are determined that even a larger number of boys

and men shall have the opportunity of the Cubbing, Scouting and Sea Scouting program. The present total membership is 3306. The objective for December 31, 1938, is 3500 and by 1942 the Council has an objective of a total membership of 4500.

Troops representing these teams are: Troop 2 of Wilmette, Troops 18 and 20 of Winnetka, Troops 35 (2 teams) and 324 of Highland Park, Troop 37 of Highwood, Troop 42 of Lake Bluff, Troop 59 (2 teams) of Libertyville, and Troops 101, 104, 111 and 115 (2 teams) of Waukegan. The winning team from this contest competes Saturday, March 19, with the winning team from Oak Park Area Council, Northwest Suburban Council, and Evanston Council.
