He returned from France uninjured, but in 1925 was taken in death following an appendectomy. Last year the eldest daughter, Mary, passed away. Living with Mr. Karch in his Deerfield home are his three daughters, Mrs. Paul M. Dietz (Laura), and the Misses Jane and Martha Karch. His other daughter, Mrs. Frank Saeman (Kitty) lives in Cross Plains, Wis., with her husband and four children.

Mr. Karch's home at the corner of Chestnut street and Deerfield road has a beautiful yard and garden, which he has kept so beautifully all by himself. In addition to his garden interests, he has made a hobby of constructing bird houses and queer little animals and people of wood, which he paints, and gives them to his many neighbors and friends throughout the village for their gardens.

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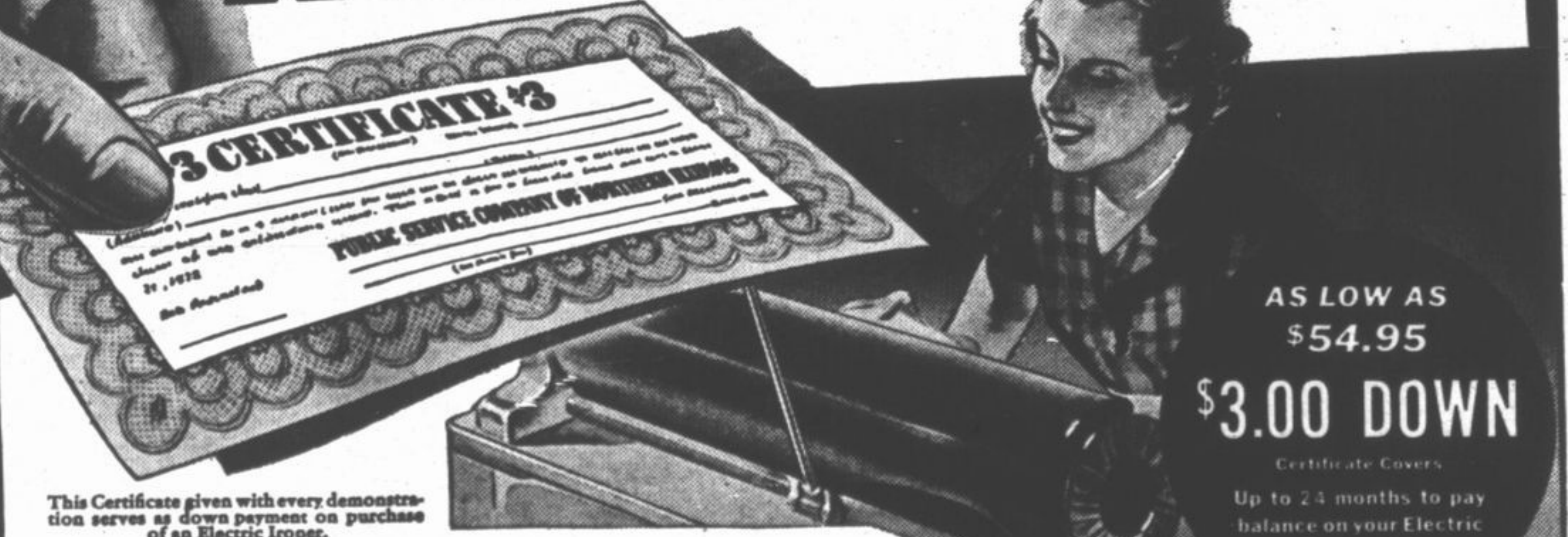
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
