

Deerfield School Board Approves Board of Education

The regular meeting of the board of directors, Illinois School District No. 109, was held at the Deerfield Grammar school Monday, March 7th at 8 p.m.

The following resolution was moved by Mr. Boyle seconded by Mr. Hout and passed by a unanimous vote;

Resolution providing for the election of a Board of Education

Whereas, it has been determined by a special census that School District 109, Lake County, Illinois has a population exceeding 100 inhabitants, and

Whereas, Section 123 of the School Law makes provision that, when it is determined by any special or general census that a district has more than 1000 inhabitants, it shall be governed by a Board of Education consisting of six members and a president,

Therefore, be it resolved, that District 109 shall hereafter be governed by a Board of Education consisting of six members and a president, and

Be it further resolved, that the secretary of the present Board of Directors, give notice to the public of an election to be held on the second Saturday of April, 1938, providing for the election of a Board of Education consisting of six members and a president, and

Be it further resolved, that the secretary of the Board of Directors give at least ten days notice to the public that District 109 will henceforth be governed by a Board of Education.

This means that the terms of all present members of the Board of Directors will expire automatically, and that an entire new board will be elected.

Petitions for candidacy must be filed on or before March 19, 1938 with the clerk.

Mr. Hout and Mr. Boyle have decided not to be candidates for the new board; Mr. Meyer stated that he will run again.

In order to clear up a misconception, it was brought out at the meeting that Mr. Meyers has never made any motion for considering, or any suggestion of a Board of Education at any school board meeting during his term of office.

It was also ascertained that there was no meeting called for Monday, Feb. 23. Therefore such a meeting obviously could not have been postponed.
