Ellen M. Guiney Noted Educator Passes On Mar. 12 Tenth Anniversary

Miss Ellen M. Guiney, for thirtyfive years a teacher and assistant principal at Elm Place grammar school, passed away Saturday morning at a sanitarium in Chicago, where she had been a patient for the past two years, following her resignation from the school, due to ill-

Funeral services were held Monday morning at St. Jerome's church, Chicago. Burial was made in Charleston, Ill., herobirthplace.

The passing of Miss Guiney, who was 76 years of age, will be mourned by a host of friends, for during her many years of activity and res- Variations for two pianes . idence here, she had endeared her-

The following tributes bespeak the high esteem of those with whom she was most closely associated.

"In February, 1903, Miss Ellen M. Guiney came to the Elm Place school to teach the fifth grade. She was brought here by Jesse L. Smith, who had come as principal in September, 1902. Miss Guiney and then moved on with her class through the sixth and seventh grades. From 1907 to 1921 she taught in the eighth grade. In 1921 she began to teach science only, chiefly geography, geology and astronomy to the eighth grade. In 1922 she was made assistant principal of the Elm Place school. In 1927, due to failing health, her work was limited to the teaching of elementary astronomy and geology. In June, 1936, at the age of 74, she Lieut. Albus rushed the girl to retired from teaching, and at that time was appointed Director-Emeritus of the Observatory and the Museum.
