

Delights Ravinia Woman's Club with Pioneer Pictures

On March 9th, the Ravinia Woman's club enjoyed some fascinating slides which Mr. Earl H. Reed showed in connection with his talk on "Pioneer Architecture in the Chicago Region." Many of the pictures showed the City of Chicago from 1840 on, including homes, hotels, and churches. Others covered residences in Galena, Peoria, St. Charles, and other communities, most construction of the period showing a decided Grecian influence. Many of Mr. Reed's listeners felt as he did: "Our present building should look like today not 1840, but we can't resist the charm and beauty of that period." Mr. Reed would like to see greater preservation and restoration of these beauties, wherever possible.

Mr. Reed, himself a prominent architect in Chicago, pursued his hobby of old houses until he became an authority on early mid-western architecture. In this connection he served as director of the Historical American Building Survey of Illinois.
