PREVENT SERIOUS FIRES

Thoughtlessness on the part of Highland Park citizens has caused the Highland Park firemen no end of work and worry during the past few days.

On Sunday from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. the department answered twelve runs to grass fires while on Monday from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. they received 23 calls.

We commend the Civic-Minded Person who is desirous of a beautiful city, but do not let that civic pride cost your neighbor the loss of his home or the destruction of his property.

The Highland Park Fire Department is ready and willing to serve the citizens at all times. The small fire loss recorded last year by the local department is evidence enough of their service and prompt response.

The time consumed at each run averages about three-quar- sary. ters of an hour. The cost to the city each time that the truck goes out is approximately \$25.

Two pumping engines are adequate equipment for a town of this size in normal conditions, but if both pumpers are responding to grass fires, what will be the result if a more urgent call from a home comes in?

"An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure" is an Tuesday morning in St. Petersburg, old addage which bears thought during this clean-up period. Use disgression as to when to burn off grass, and avoid ser-

ious destruction during high winds. Your neighbor, your fire chief and your city officials will appreciate your co-operation and you will be rendering a real civic service to your city by preventing serious fires.
