**PREVENT SERIOUS FIRES**

Thoughtlessness on the part of Highland Park citizens has caused the Highland Park firemen no end of work and worry during the past few days.

On Sunday from 11 a. m. to 3 p. m. the department answered twelve runs to grass fires while on Monday from 10 a. m. to 9 p. m. they received 23 calls.

We commend the Civic-Minded Person who is desirous of a beautiful city, but do not let that civic pride cost your neighbor the loss of his home or the destruction of his property.

The Highland Park Fire Department is ready and willing to serve the citizens at all times. The small fire loss recorded last year by the local department is evidence enough of their service and prompt response.

The time consumed at each run averages about three-quarters of an hour. The cost to the city each time that the truck goes out is approximately \$25.

Two pumping engines are adequate equipment for a town of this size in normal conditions, but if both pumpers are responding to grass fires, what will be the result if a more urgent call from a home comes in?

"An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure" is an old adage which bears thought during this clean-up period.

Use discretion as to when to burn off grass, and avoid serious destruction during high winds.

Your neighbor, your fire chief and your city officials will appreciate your co-operation and you will be rendering a real civic service to your city by preventing serious fires.

**SPRING IS HERE**

Believe it or not, spring is here. It was ushered in Monday with one of the most gloriously warm spring days recorded in many years.

However the rapid return to winter, Wednesday, may cause some skepticism, but if there is any foundation to indications which point to an early spring, cold weather will soon disappear.

Birds of every description have been returning in flocks during the past week, some arriving two weeks ahead of schedule. Buds on bushes and trees have burst forth, with tulips and perennials showing themselves out of the ground.

Other elements which are said to be sure proof of an early spring are the appearance of earth worms near the surface of the ground indicating the departure of frost from the soil; the clinging of moths to the windows at night, also indicates the arrival of spring. Snakes shed their skins upon the arrival of spring, and according to reports the floors of the snake cages at Brookfield zoo are literally covered with discarded skins. Turkeys do not begin to lay eggs until spring, and farmers in this vicinity who raise these fowls claim that their birds have begun to lay.

So don't lose hope. SPRING IS HERE. Good old Lake Michigan which turns so many hot sultry days into comfortably cool summer evenings is just playing another prank on North Shore residents to show his control over the shore line elements.
