## DECLARATION OF PRINCIPLES

One of the most fundamental and basic principles of a Democracy is that a people participate in the governing of themselves, which, in turn, calls for an emphasis upon HOME RULE or Local Government: not a centralization of government and authority into a Bureaucracy. Generally speaking, the more centralized a government, either a Bureaucracy or Dictatorship,

I am opposed to the unjust Sales Tax. I favor a reduction in all forms of other taxation. This can be accomplished by drastic reduction in cost of govern-Reduction of Auto License Fees.

As your representative I shall at all times be interested in any legislation proposed and presented by authentic, nationally recognized, and substantial representatives of labor, and at no time will I have any consideration for any outside influences that are not AMERICAN!

I favor collective bargaining; the abolishment of Child

Labor; Unemployment Insurance; and Compulsory employment of capable men 45 years of age and over.

Industry and Business:

Reduce governmental interference. Allow business to operate with as little governmental interference as possible. Take the Government out of business and put some semblance of business in the Government. Agriculture:

Opposed to any program of scarsity.

Interested in Dairy Farmers of Illinois and the marketing of their products. I am especially interested in our dairy farmers. The flow of milk from other States has done much to demoralize our own producers. Such measures should be adopted that would assure Illinois Farmers a market for all the milk they now produce. the milk they now produce.

Revision of inspection practices on a Chicago-State cooperative basis. Education:

I am favorable to a State Board of Education, which shall act only in an advisory capacity, and be without executive I am favorable to the Illinois State Teachers Program

Local administration of relief without political domination.
