The Lesson-Sermon also included the following passage from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "Erroneous belief is destroyed by truth. Change the evidence and that disappears which before seemed real to this false belief and the human consciousness rises higher. Thus the reality of being is attained and man found to be immortal" (p. 297).
