He is young, personable, cultured and scholarly and he has a great number of friends and acquaintances who are confidently looking forward to his success in the Primaries.

Mr. Yager was married to Miss Emilie Aiken, daughter of Mrs. Josephine Black of Winthrop Harbor, three years ago.

Mr. Yager has never sought public office, but his family has contributed several efficient men to the conduct of Lake county affairs. His grandfather, Chase D. Webb, was

Sheriff of Lake county in 1886 when the first four-year term was inaugurated. His uncle Bob Smart has served Waukegan as city commissioner and his father was twice mayor of Waukegan.

Harley D. Jones, candidate for Republican nomination for Congressman at Large for the State of Illinois, was born and reared on a farm at Bradford, Ill. He held the rank of private, corporal, sergeant, Battalion Sergeant Major, Regimental Sergeant Major, First Lieutenant and Captain in the Reserve Corps.
