Whole Wheat Quick Coffee Cake March 21, 1938 1 cup sugar

1 cup whole wheat flour 1/2 cup white flour

2 teas. baking powder 1/2 teas. soda 1/4 teas, salt

1 cup sour milk 2 eggs

1/2 teas, vanilla 2 tbslp. shortening

for 450 degrees and light same. Sift room sauce. together dry ingredients. Add unbeaten egg yolks with sour milk, melted shortening and vanilla. Mix quickly but thoroughly. Put in round or oblong pan and cover with top mixture made of the following: Mix well 4 tblsp. flour, with 2 tblsp. sugar, and 1 teas. cinnamon. Sprin-20 to 25 minutes.

Broiled Kabobs March 22, 1938 11/2 lb. sirloin steak, (1 inch thick) 12 mushrooms.

Cut steak in 1 inch squares. Place on skewers alternating steak and mushrooms. Preheat broiler to hot (450 degrees). Arrange kabobs (meat and mushrooms) on broiler rack and broil 15 minutes, turning to brown on all sides.
