LENTEN MEDITATION

"The world's real crisis at this time of anxiety is not political, nor financial; underlying all of these crises is a deeper crisis, that of morality and religion." These words are taken from a recent circular of a well known financial institution. With varying emphasis it is being said on every side.

We have all concerned ourselves with the vast increase of production. We have been eminently successful in this. But out of our new plenty we have learned that there is something essential that does not come with plenty alone. There are deeper needs. There are essential wants that are fed from deeper springs. In fact our very plenty appears to have power to unsettle our lives and introduce tensions that are new.

A people surrounded with the myriad output of marvellous productive processes can be bewildered and defeated in the midst of their abundance. Things do not bring peace and confidence. They do not answer the questions they introduce.

The demanded mastery and control must come from inner assurances. That means religion. That means the religious life. That means—and somehow we MUST get it—time for reflection, worship and communion.

It is one of the strange anomalies of history that a day that thought it could bow God out of the picture is finding in its new escapes a new imperious demand for God.

Can we not in the presence of this demand be very reverent, very sincere, very generous to others and very loyal to our own Christian convictions?

The day calls for it. And "the most important agency in the world to-day is the Christian Church." This is a further quotation from the above mentioned circular. In many a form this conviction is taking shape in the hearts and minds of thoughtful people. Somehow out of the prevailing confusion men and women are being directed anew to the significance, the possibilities and the grandeur of the Church.
