Autos Crash And Burn; Highwood Man Is Victim

James Belmonti, 29, of 233 Washington avenue, Highwood, died Monday in Lake County hospital, from burns incurred early Sunday morning when two cars caught fire following a collision on Sheridan road south of Great Lakes Naval station.

Peno Favelli, 36 years old, who was riding with Belmonti, and Le Roy Hawkins, 23, of 669 Kennard street, Waukegan, driver of the other car, were both badly burned.

Belmonti and Favelli were driving south with Favelli at the wheel when their car crashed into the rear of the Hawkins' car. Both cars burst into flames with the three men pinned in the wreckage.

This was the second accident in which Belmonti was involved, where cars collided and caught fire. He was an occupant of one of the cars which collided on West Deerfield road a few years ago when Bernice Swan met a similar fate.

Funeral services were held yesterday morning at St. James church, Highwood, with burial in Ascension cemetery.

Mr. Belmonti was born in the province of Caliba, Italy, Oct. 4, 1897, and had been a resident of Highwood for 25 years. He is survived by his wife and four children, Eugene, Marie, Donald and James; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. James Belmonti, three brothers, Sam, Fred and Louis, and four sisters, Angir, Minnie, Edith and Olanda.
