Mrs. Martin Johnson To Present Film "Jungles Calling" April 20th

On Wednesday, April 20th, at 8:15 p.m., at the Highland Park High School Auditorium, Mrs. Martin Johnson (Osa Johnson) will present her lecture and film, "Jungles Calling," the finest Martin Johnson film



ever released, containing the most exciting adventures in all their pictures. It is a saga of exploration and adventure too tremendous to describe.

Audiences of from 2,000 to 10,000 have been thronging the auditoriums throughout the country for Osa Johnson's performances on this lecture tour. This will be Mrs. Johnson's only appearance on the North Shore, and the public's one and only chance to see the most thrilling moments from all the Martin Johnson films—a record going back twenty-seven years to the time when they started for the South Sea Islands in a sailboat so tiny Osa had to be tied on deck to keep her from falling overboard. The film is so cut and timed that thrill follows thrill, mounting to a series of climaxes it would be impossible to duplicate today, many of the native tribes and wild animals having succumbed to the inroads of civilization.

The Martin Johnsons have long been the heroes of those who love adventure. To see and hear this diminutive but tremendously courageous and thoroughly fascinating person, who so often stood by holding the gun while her husband cranked the camera, relate the story of their adventures, will be a rare treat for all of Highland Park. The performance begins at 8:15 p.m. Doors will be open at 7 o'clock. There are over 1100 unreserved seats. The new loud speaking system installed at the high school the past year makes it possible for Mrs. Johnson to be heard perfectly throughout the auditorium.

Local Churches To Observe Easter With Appropriate Services

Churches throughout the world will be observing the Resurrection of Christ with appropriate services and musical programs. Here in Highland Park the local churches have arranged special services in commemoration of Easter and every resident should attend some church service on that day.

Never before in the history of the world has Christianity been more greatly needed than in the present world crisis. The plea to "Go to Church" should be heeded by every thinking person who is desirous of better conditions—a more Christian world.

Highland Park churches offer a welcome to all citizens. Choose the church you wish to attend and go to church Sunday. Following is a list of the local churches with a brief outline of the services which will be held Easter Sunday:

At the Redeemer Lutheran Church, special Easter music will be sung by the choir. The sermon for the 10:30 a.m. service will be "The Stone Is Rolled Away." At a preparatory service at 10:15 a.m. the topic will be "Chosen Witnesses of the Resurrection."

Highland Park Presbyterian Church will present an Easter story from the Bible with visual help from slides when the Sunday School convenes at 9:45 a.m. Baptism of infants and little children will be held at the morning service at 11

a.m. Dr. Sherwin will preach on "The Increase of Life." Special music will be sung by the quartet.

Easter services at the **Highwood Methodist Church** will include a message from the pastor, Rev. E. Fredrickson at 11 a.m. This service will be preceded by the Sunday school which convenes at 10:30 a.m. In the evening the Sunday school will present its usual Easter program.

A sunrise service and observance of the Lord's Supper will be held at **St. John's Evangelical Church**, followed by breakfast. Easter worship and observance of Holy Communion with special music completes the day's program.

At **Bethany Church**, Sunday school will meet at 7:30 a.m. Choral celebration of the Holy Communion and sermon at 11 a.m. At 4:30 p.m. the church school service and presentation of the Lenten offering will be held.

First United Evangelical Church announces Sunday school at 9:30 a.m. followed by the regular service at 10:45 at which the sermon will be "Christ Arose." An Easter cantata will be sung by the choir in the evening at 7:45.

Zion Lutheran Church of Highwood will hold Sunday school at 9:45 a.m. In the evening the Sunday school will present an Easter program at 7 p.m.

First Church of Christ, Scientist will observe the regular Sunday schedule, with Sunday school at 9:30 a.m. and morning service at 11 a.m.

LENTEN MEDITATION

"And when they came unto the place which is called, The skull, there they crucified him." (Luke 23:33a)

The outward manifestations of triumph apparent on Palm Sunday were short-lived for Jesus. The crowd that shouted "Hosanna" as the Master rode into the city of Jerusalem soon changed the note of its cry. For on Friday of the same week they shouted "Crucify Him, crucify Him." He who had been their benefactor and had offered them salvation now became the object of their fury.

Consequently, the death of Jesus was tragic regardless of all that it means to Christendom today. But is there any life the pattern of which is complete without tragedy? Sometimes we are led to believe that life is mainly composed of tragic circumstances with which we seem pathetically unable to cope. Even the Gospel of John says, "In the world ye shall have tribulation."

But the death of Jesus soon took on other than tragic elements. Christ transformed the world's greatest tragedy into the world's greatest victory. For His purpose was in harmony with God's purpose. He had spiritual resources and spiritual power that changed that tragedy into a glorious experience for Himself and for us. Nineteen centuries later we sing with John Bowring

"Bane and blessing, pain and pleasure
By the cross are sanctified"

Just so, whether tragedy comes into our lives unannounced or is anticipated, it need not mean for us the end of all that is good, the terminus of our happiness. We can make our tragedies the means of a greater joy and of a deeper grace. You and I can never tap the deepest levels of spiritual power until we face some tragically difficult situation. For it is only when we have a deep need, that Christ can reveal something of the depth of His infinite love and power.

If, therefore, we can meet tragedy in the spirit and power of Christ, tragedy will leave our lives richer and pure. But if we are as stupid and as indifferent to the spiritual meanings involved as were the men who gambled for the clothes of Jesus at the foot of the cross, then tragedy will leave us cynical, disillusioned and poverty-stricken. For the thing that tragedy does to us depends entirely upon what tragedy finds in us.
