Pattara Cake (April 11th, 1938)

1 cup butter
2 cups sugar
4 eggs
1 1/2 teas. vanilla
1 1/2 cups pastry flour
3 teas. baking powder
1/2 teas. salt
1 cup milk

Light oven and set regulator at moderate (350 degrees). Cream butter, add sugar gradually, creaming continually. Add unbeaten eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add flavoring. Add 1.3 cup milk and 1 cup flour. Beat well. Repeat. Add remaining liquid. Fold in remaining flour, sifted with baking powder and salt. Bake in 3 nine inch paper lined layer pans, 30 to 35 minutes. Remove cakes from oven, let stand 1 minute; remove to cake cooler; pull off paper. Ice with your favorite icing.

Apple Rice Pudding (April 12th, 1938)

3 tblsp. lemon juice
3 cups sliced apples
2 1/2 cups water
1 cup sugar
2 cups cooked rice
1 tblsp. cinnamon
1 1/2 teas. nutmeg
2 1/2 tblsp. butter
1 tblsp. vanilla

Add lemon juice to sliced apples. Stir water into sugar; place on flame and when melted stir in apples and spices; cook 5 minutes. Add butter, vanilla and cooked rice. Turn into buttered baking dish and bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) 30 minutes. Serve plain or with whipped cream. Or if desired, top with meringue.

Ham Slices with Macaroni (April 13th, 1938)

1/2 lb. macaroni, broken in 4 inch pieces.
1/2 cup milk, 6 or 8 thin slices of boiled ham.

Cook macaroni in rapidly boiling salted water until tender (1 tps. salt in each quart water). Drain. Wrap a bundle of cooked macaroni in a slice of boiled ham, skewer or

tie in center. Place in shallow baking dish with the milk. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) for 30 to 35 minutes. Serve with horseradish sauce.

Hot Cross Buns (April 14th, 1938)

3/4 cup shortening
1/2 cup sugar
1 teas. salt
1 1/2 cups milk
1 cake yeast
2 eggs or 4 egg yolks
1/2 teas. cinnamon
4 1/2 cups flour

Stir shortening, sugar and salt into lukewarm milk. Stir in yeast. Add beaten eggs. Add cinnamon and half the flour. Beat thoroughly. Add the remaining flour to make a dough that can be handled without sticking. Knead a few minutes. Form into ball. Place in greased bowl and grease top. Cover and allow to double in bulk. Punch down and let rise double in bulk again. Form into oven sized balls, place on a cookie sheet and flatten with palm of hand. Cover and let rise until light. Cut a cross on top of each bun, brush with milk or a little milk and egg beaten together. Sprinkle with granulated sugar and cinnamon, if desired. Bake in a hot oven (400 degrees) 15 to 20 minutes. While warm decorate with crosses made of white icing.

Orange Omelet (April 15th, 1938)

5 eggs
5 tblsp. orange juice
1/2 teas. baking powder
1/2 tblsp. powdered sugar
1/4 teas. salt
Grated rind of 1 orange
2 tblsp. butter

Separate eggs. To yolks add orange juice, and beat until light and thick. Beat whites until frothy, add baking powder and beat until stiff. Add powdered sugar, salt and grated rind. Fold into first mixture. Place butter in frying pan; when melted turn in egg mixture and

cook gently for 5 minutes on top of stove; then place in moderate oven (325 degrees) for 15 minutes. Serve on hot platter and garnish with slices of orange.

Baked Ham With Apricots (April 16th, 1938)

1 slice ham, 1 1/2 inches thick
1 tblsp. whole cloves
12 apricot halves
6 tblsp. water
6 tblsp. brown sugar
1/2 teas. mace
1/2 teas. cinnamon
1/2 teas. cloves

Gash fat on edge of ham. Place in hot frying pan and sear quickly on both sides. Place in baking dish, stick cloves around edge. Cover with apricot halves first heated in their own syrup. Mix sugar, spices and water. Pour over ham and apricots. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) 1 hour and 15 minutes.
