"The two organizations, working together, brought aid to 381,274 children last year, expending more than \$1,600,000 in the work. "The first concern of the Legion and Auxiliary is the children of World War Veterans, hundreds of thousands of whom are thrown into need by the death or disability of their fathers. For these children the full resources of the two great organizations are called into action. Emergency relief is given and efforts made to place the children permanently satisfactory situation. Keeping the family together and maintaining the home is always the first aim.

"The child welfare program is not confined to aiding children of veterans but includes a wide range of activities for the benefit of all children. Prevention of juvenile delinquency is work now receiving much attention from the Legion and Auxiliary. Positive Health work is another important part of the child welfare program, clinics being sponsored, public health nurses supported, immunization campaigns conducted and weakened children sent to health camps.


