Rev. H. F. Siemsen Begins Tenth Year at Bethany Church

The 94th session of the Illinois conference of the Evangelical church came to a close on Sunday afternoon with a great mass meeting of over 3,000 Evangelicals who gathered in the Masonic Temple on the corner of Kedzie and Altgett streets in Chicago. This great host of people were lead to a high pitch of inspiration by the masterly sermon preached by Bishop George Edward Epp, who spoke on the subject "Credo-I Believe." His sermon was a tremendous challenge to every one present. Following the sermon three young men were ordained as deacons in the ministry, while six were ordained as elders, this was not only impresive, but it was a very sacred moment in the conference. After the ordination service, the appointments for the coming year were read by Bishop Epp. Less than 15 of the 125 pastors of the state were changed. Only four churches in the Chicago area are receiving new pastors. Rev. H. F.
