The closing meeting of the year under the capable direction of Mrs. Frank J. Ronan and her able board of directors, of the Highland Park high school P.-T.A., will take place Thursday, May 5. The club has had a very successful year, with large crowds in attendance at the interesting programs provided by the program chairman, Mrs. Edwin T. R. Murfey. The monthly conferences between mothers and teachers have proven very beneficial to the faculty members, the mothers, and in turn to the students, in ironing out problems and bettering the understanding between the home and the school.

The annual meeting will be preceded, as always by the conferences and informal tea, which start at 3 o'clock, and conclude promptly at

3:45. There will be an important business meeting, with short reports from all the officers and directors, and election of officers for the coming year.

The program will be a unique and attractive one. It will consist of an inspection and explanation of the newly organized Nursery school, which has been operating only since the beginning of the second semester. Directed by Miss Madeleine Swetland, a graduate of Oberlin college, a registered nurse from the Presbyterian hospital in Chicago, and a one-time student at the National Kindergarten college in Evanston, whose personality plus these splendid qualifications make her especially fitted for the position, the course has an enrollment of twenty-three junior and senior girls. It is run in connection with the Junior Nursing course, and is attended by about ten youngsters of three years of age, who come in the morning, remain to lunch and an afternoon nap and for a play period in the afternoon. Such an innovation is in line with the progressive policy of the school in introducing into its curriculum educational courses of proven worth.
