

### Wm. E. Waterhouse Local Jeweler Is Taken by Death

William E. Waterhouse, for 38 years engaged in the jewelry business in Highland Park, passed away Sunday morning at the Highland Park hospital, following a week's illness. Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at 2:30 p.m. at Kelley's chapel. The Rev. H. F. Siemsen, pastor of Bethany Evangelical church, officiated. Cremation followed at Graceland cemetery.

Mr. Waterhouse was born October 31, 1861, at Hamilton, Ohio, where he received his early training and grew to manhood. After completing his education he became vitally interested in the work of a jeweler and thus learned the trade of a watchmaker, which vocation he followed throughout his entire lifetime.

On June 30, 1887, he was married to Miss Mary Ellen Nizer. In 1900 they came to Highland Park where they have since resided. It was the happy privilege of Mr. and Mrs. Waterhouse to celebrate their golden wedding last June.

During the past twenty years Mr. Waterhouse and his wife had made his home with their daughter, Mrs. Fred Okey of N. St. Johns avenue. Besides his wife, Mr. Waterhouse leaves to mourn four children. They are Mrs. Ilo Straight of this city, Mr. Elmer Waterhouse of Sioux City, S. D., Mrs. Beasie Okey of this city and Mrs. Nellie Boucher of Libertyville. There are also 10 grandchildren and one great grandchild.
