H. P. High School Band Wins First Honors In State

Last Saturday night at about 11 p.m. in the University of Illinois auditorium, the platform announcer sent ninety Highland Park high school band members into rounds of cheers by announcing that theirs was one of the five bands selected to represent Illinois in the National Band Contest in Elkhart on May 21st. Proviso of Maywood will also play at Elkhart, as well as Waukegan and Morton who were recommended to the biennial event in the state contest last year.

Director Harold Finch's band played beautifully. The three judges, who were the band directors at Wisconsin, Northwestern and Chicago universities, joined the Highland Park fans who accompanied the band in pronouncing their rendition of Wagner's "Wotan's Farewell and Fire Charm Music" from "Die Valkure" a well-nigh perfect exhibition.

Jerry Baum on horn, Julius Laegler on alto clarinet, Leslie Rankin on tenor sax, and the Woodwinds

Trio, composed of Audrey Prindle, Jeanette Bryant and Enid Ball were also placed in first division and recommended to the national contest.

Art Pier, Newt Hoffman, Miriam Wichman and Sylvia Wagner were among those winning second honors in the finals of the solo and ensemble contest.

For the first time, the national contest this year will be divided into regionals so that no band will be more than a few hundred miles from their assigned city.
