### HVALE FORGE

Mr. and Mrs. Carl E. Olson had as their Sunday guests the J. T. Petersons of Wilmette.

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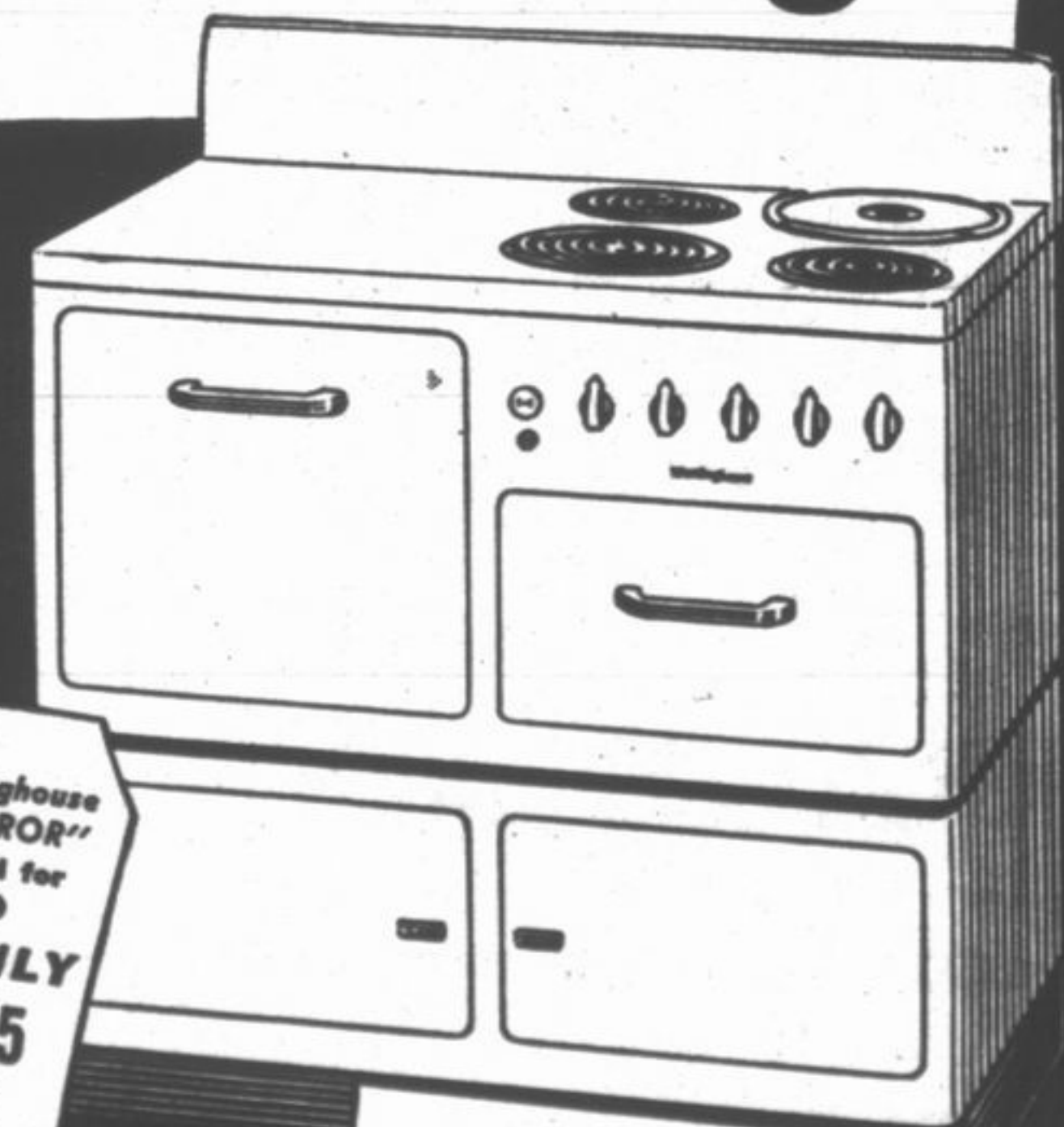
