Ravinia Man Hurt in Auto Accident

Blinded by the headlights of a northbound automobile early today, Alfred Wagner, 39, of the Northmoor Country club, Ravinia, was seriously injured when his car crashed into a guard rail at the S-curve on Sheridan road north of Waukegan.

Wagner, riding alone, was traveling south on Sheridan road shortly after 1 a.m. when the accident happened. A passing motorist took Wagner to Victory Memorial hospital. He was found to be suffering from back injuries and possible internal injuries.

Pupil Achievement Above Average

"Pupil achievement is above the average in our impression," reads a report by Clyde M. Campbell and F. C. Hood, high school inspectors from the University of Illinois, who visited the Highland Park high school about ten days ago.

On the basis of the report of these men to the North Central Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges, graduates of the Highland Park high school are admitted without examinations to institutions of higher learning all over the United States.

"The school spirit of the students is excellent," the report continues, "and an especially fine relationship between teachers and pupils is to be observed. The pupils are attentive, interested, and responsive in classroom work. The provision for extra-curricular activities is satisfactory. The school is well organized and

operating efficiently, and the relationship between the community, board of education, and teachers appears to be excellent.

"The esprit de corps of the teachers appears to be excellent," reads the report, "and we received a very general favorable impression of the faculty. The teachers are well trained for the work to which they have been assigned; about half of them have master's degrees and a number of those who hold only bachelor's degrees have done a considerable amount of graduate work. The teacher load is satisfactory, and we observed no instruction which appeared to be below average. Some of it appeared to be very good, indeed. The program of studies is satisfactory."

"In general, the instructional equipment is very good, well organized, well cared for, and effectively used. The library, which is extensive and well selected, is well organized and supervised. "You have an old building," the

report reads in conclusion, "which is well kept and fairly adequate for the present enrollment and the particular courses offered. The building is situated in an attractive location, and, although the grounds are limited, they are well kept. The janitorial service is very superior and is worthy of special mention."
