Sunday Evening Club, Ends Season With Patriotic Program

Another distinguished veteran, Charles O. Brown, the last of the Ulysses S. Grant post of which he was for many years commander, will be present.

Representatives of the American Legion, Red Cross, Boy Scouts and civic organizations are to be on the platform, Dr. Samuel D. Harkness, Winnetka Congregational church, is to speak on the subject, "The New Birth of Freedom." He will be introduced by Clifford W. Barnes, who also will speak a word to the veterans.

LIBRARY

Harcourt Brace and Company, one of our good publishing houses, has just recently finished a survey of the magazines which book buyers read. The questionnaire was sent to the mailing list, which the company has collected over a period of years, made up of those people who have requested book catalogs. The entire list contains some 9,000 names. A return of over 2000 questionnaires forms the basis of the results published in a recent Publishers' Weekly. The ten magazines most frequently read by these persons are as follows:

Reader's Digest, Life, Time, Saturday Evening Post, Atlantic Monthly, Harper's, Saturday Review of Literature, Good Housekeeping, Scribner's, Literary Digest.

All of these publications are to be found on the shelves of the Highland Park Public Library and may be borrowed for home reading.

Education of a Diplomat, by Hugh Wilson.

In these intimate and frank memoirs, Hugh Wilson, now Ambassador to Germany, reveals the halcyon and hectic life he lived between the placid year of 1911 and the tumultuous year of 1917 when all the world was at war. Few Americans engaged in foreign service have taken the public into their confidence, and so simply set down the complete life of a diplomat. This distinguished autobiographer raises the curtain upon the career of diplomacy and resets the scenes of history.

A Mirror to Geneva, by George Slocomb.

The mirror is a clear and polished one, and Mr. Slocombe holds it so that the whole history of the League of Nations, from Wilson to Anthony Eden, is caught within its framework. The author is one of today's shrewdest and most experienced foreign correspondents. He presents a lively portrait gallery of the statesmen and functionaries who have

shaped and controlled the League, so full and varied that it gives a personal, behind-the-scenes story of 18 years of international politics.

Conquest of the Past, by Prince Hubertus zu Lowenstein.

Hubertus zu Lowenstein, the famous "Red Prince," direct descendant of twelve Roman-German emperors, was born in the ancient family castle of Schoenwoerth, in the Austrian Tyrol. Gradually realizing the dead weight of feudal tradition, he broke with his family and all that they stood for, and threw himself ardently into the struggle to build a new and democratic Germany. It was an impossible task. "Conquest of the Past" is an autobiography of dramatic contrasts. In the Name of Common Sense, by Matthew N. Chappell.
