Here and nowhere else is born sterling patriotism the noblest offspring of still more noble stock binding man to his God and to his country. This is precisely why they serve their country best who serve their God first. This is why revealed religion is the strongest bulwark and the surest safeguard of American liberty and American institutions. This is why our country can never find more loyal citizens than they who take their religion from the charter of Christ and their politics from the constitution of the United States. This is why unswerving fealty to the Cross spells undivided loyalty to the flag.

You have heard how it was said to them of old: "Unless the Lord guard the city, they labor in vain who guard it." What else is this but the overpowering light of God's eternal truth pointing to revealed religion as the keystone of the arch which upholds the stability of every nation seeking to perpetuate the blessings of civil government. What else is this but the eternal decree of the Most High solemnizing the wedlock of religion and patriotism. What God has joined together, let no man put asunder. What else is this but the finger of God amal-

gamating the charter of rights with the charter of duties. Liberty, equality and fraternity, the sacred symbol of rights correlated and cemented by hierarchy, veneration and obedience, the august symbol of duties. What else is this but the inspiration of the poet when he asks:

What constitutes a state?
 Not cities proud nor broad armed ports,
 Not starred nor spangled courts,
 No, men, high minded men.

High minded men are the product of growth and development according to the laws of man's being. The exigencies of such laws are far from salient features of the modern propaganda masquerading in the guise of social consciousness, civic betterment, economic justice, social service or anything else rising no higher than mere naturalism. Not at all. Religion strikes its roots deeper and throws its branches higher and broader. It strikes its roots in the necessary relations between Creator and creature and it shoots its branches into every faculty of his being and into every artery of his life. Individual, domestic and national. Religion and patriotism therefore are rooted in submission to lawfully constituted authority in organized society. Both the one and the other always demand sacrifice. Both the one and the other may even go so far as to demand the supreme sacrifice whenever a turn in the tide of affairs points to an enemy seeking to undermine those vital interests at the basis of social security.

The fathers of our commonwealth, the makers of our constitution, the genius of our statesmen, the songs of our bards, the anthems of our nation, and the blood of our heroes eloquently proclaim this very doctrine in language inspiring and in deeds sublime leaving us therein the richest traditions of our land. The memory of all this is consecrated in the day we celebrate. While we gratefully honor the memory of our soldier dead, no short sighted policy should suffer us to close our eyes to the pressing need of another soldiery not called to don the helmet and shoulder a gun. No, I speak of another soldiery whose armor is an intelligent survey of the problems vexing our country and the necessary moral courage to battle those problems until the enemy is utterly routed. We are subsidizing a press which is espousing a vicious propaganda. We are supporting theatres undermining the moral fibre of our youth. We are paying taxes to maintain godless schools. We are allowing capital and labor to wage a death-like struggle. We are quite indifferent to alien influence seeking to poison the wells of our national life by subtle schemes made to trap the unwary and give them all that appeals to the discontented and the underfed. The time for vigorous action is at hand. Americans, fellow citizens, the call to arms is sounded. The enemies are boring from within. If God is with us, who can stand against us? If the Cross shields the flag, the Stars and Stripes will never trail in the dust of oppression. If the Cross shields the flag, the Stars and Stripes will herald the downfall of evil minded propaganda and the triumph of lasting democracy.

To this cause each and every loyal American consecrates his hand and his heart, his chattels and his fireside, yea, his kindred and his life. May we never waver in the sublime ideal embodied in our national anthem where the seer of Maryland sings:

Then conquer we must, when our cause it is just,
 And this be our motto, in God is our trust.
 And the Star Spangled Banner in triumph shall wave
 While the land of the free is the home of the brave.

Do You Know Illinois?

Q. How many times was the proposal of calling a Constitutional Convention put between 1818 and 1848?

A. Three times. The proposal was put to the people in 1824 and 1842 and failed. Again in 1846 the people voted for a Constitutional Convention.

Q. When and where did the convention meet?

A. June 7, 1847, at Springfield.

Q. How many delegates were there and how were they divided politically?

A. 162. Ninety-two were democrats, the remainder whigs.

Q. Who were the presiding officers of the convention?

A. Newton Cloud, president; Henry W. Moore, secretary, and John A. Wilson, sergeant-at-arms.

Q. What impasse developed between two delegates in argument were passed by the convention?

A. Thompson Campbell and O. C. Pratt argued so violently that they finally agreed to arbitrate by duel. The police intervened and stopped the duel.

Q. What important elective rules were passed by the convention?

A. Provision was made for the election of supreme court justices as well as all the State officers.

Q. What provisions were made concerning divorce?

A. That divorces should be granted only for such causes as might be specified by general laws, and not by the legislature directly.

Q. What ruling was made with regard to lotteries?

A. No lotteries might be authorized for any purpose.

Q. How was the question of the State Bank dealt with?

A. That the charter of the State Bank, or any other bank heretofore existing in the State should not be revived or extended.

Q. What was done about the Council of Revision?

A. This governmental body, which had been adopted from the law of the State of New York, was abolished and in lieu thereof the governor was given the veto power.

Q. Where in Springfield is there a notable collection of flags of Illinois regiments?

A. Memorial Hall in the Centennial building.

Q. How many regimental and independent battalion flags are there in Memorial Hall?

A. 463.

Q. How many Mexican War flags are there?

A. Two.

Q. How many Civil War flags are there?

A. 346.

Q. How many of the flags are from World War regiments?

A. Ninety-three.

Q. How many of the flags are from the Spanish-American War?

A. Twenty-one.

Q. Are all the flags in good condition?

A. 371 of them were in need of

restoration before being placed in the cases in Memorial Hall. Twenty-one women spent nearly five years quilting each of these flags between two layers of black net.

Q. How many units do the 463 flags represent?

A. Mexican War, one unit; Civil War, 132 units; Spanish-American War, 12 units; World War, 56 units.

Q. How are the various military divisions designated by color?

A. Infantry, blue; artillery, red; cavalry, yellow; signal corps, orange.

Q. What names appear on the architrave of Memorial Hall in the Centennial building?

A. Those of 27 generals of Illinois: Grant, Logan, Prentiss, Hurlbut, Buford, Rowett, Smith, Oglesby, Morgan, Jurchin, Shields, Farnsworth, Wallace, McClelland, Atkins, Carlin, Baker, artillery, red; Hardin, Palmer, Rawlins, Wilson, Merritt, Grierson, Schofield, and Pope.




