SOFT COOKED CHOCOLATE FROSTING (May 28, 1988) sq. unsweetened cho cup granulated sugar thelp. butter

teas, vanilla

Put chocolate, broken in small pieces, sugar and 1 cup milk in saucepan, over simmer burner. Stir until chocolate is melted. Shake flour and remaining 1/2 cup milk in small (1/2 pint) jar until smooth. Slowly add to chocolate mixture. Return to gas flame and cook until thick, about 7 minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from flame. Add butter and stir until blended. Add flavoring and cool. Spread on cake.

> LITTLE BLACK SAMBOES (May 24, 1938)

1/2 cup shortening 11/4 cups white flour cup brown sugar 1% cup rolled oats
% lb. dates cup buttermilk

SWEET DOUGH POUNDATION (May 26, 1938) 2 caldes yeast teas. salt 1/4 cups milk

cup butter

5 cups flour

2 cup sugar To yeast add lukewarm milk, butter, sugar, salt and beaten eggs. Add enough flour to make a thick batter and beat well. Add remaining flour to make a soft dough. Turn out on floured pastry cloth and knead until satiny. Place in a greased bowl, grease surface, cover and let rise until double in bulk. When light, knead down by rolling to desired shape for tea ring, rolls or coffee cake. Let rise until double in bulk. Bake in a moderately hot oven (375 degrees) 25 to 30 minutes for coffee cakes. In a hot oven (400 to 450 degrees) 15 to 20 minutes for rolls. Change of temperature depends on size of rolls.
