SOFT COOKED CHOCOLATE FROSTING

(May 28, 1938)
4 sq. unsweetened chocolate
1 cup granulated sugar
2 tblsp. butter
1 1/2 cups milk
5 tblsp. flour
1 teas. vanilla

Put chocolate, broken in small pieces, sugar and 1 cup milk in saucepan, over simmer burner. Stir until chocolate is melted. Shake flour and remaining 1/2 cup milk in small (1/2 pint) jar until smooth. Slowly add to chocolate mixture. Return to gas flame and cook until thick, about 7 minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from flame. Add butter and stir until blended. Add flavoring and cool. Spread on cake.

LITTLE BLACK SAMBOES

Brownies
(May 24, 1938)
1/2 cup shortening
1 cup brown sugar
2 eggs
1 1/2 cup rolled oats
1/2 lb. dates
1 1/2 cups white flour
1/2 teas. salt
1/2 teas. soda
1/2 cup buttermilk
1/2 cup walnut meats

Light gas oven and set regulator at 350 degrees. Cream shortening; add brown sugar and cream again. Add unbeaten eggs, one at a time, mixing thoroughly after each addition. Mix oats and chopped dates. Sift remaining dry ingredients. Add to first mixture with buttermilk, oats and dates. Add nuts. Stir until thoroughly mixed. Spread about 1/4 inch thick on cookie sheet. Bake 25 to 30 minutes. Cut at once into strips or squares.

CANNED PINEAPPLE

Open kettle method
(May 25, 1938)
2 large pineapples
3 cups water
2 cups sugar

Pare, remove eyes, slice, dice or grate pineapple. Put sugar and water in preserving kettle and bring to boiling point. Add prepared pineapple, and simmer gently until tender, 25 to 30 minutes. Turn into hot sterilized jars, fitted with new rubbers. Fill to overflowing with hot syrup. Place sterilized cover in position and seal at once. (N.B. If Kerr jars are used fill jar to within 1/2 inch of top with syrup. Place sterilized cover in position, and screw band tight.)

SWEET DOUGH FOUNDATION

(May 26, 1938)
2 cakes yeast
1 1/2 cups milk
1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup sugar
1 teas. salt
2 eggs
5 cups flour

To yeast add lukewarm milk, butter, sugar, salt and beaten eggs. Add enough flour to make a thick batter and beat well. Add remaining flour to make a soft dough. Turn out on floured pastry cloth and knead until satiny. Place in a greased bowl, grease surface, cover and let rise until double in bulk. When light, knead down by rolling to desired shape for tea ring, rolls or coffee cake. Let rise until double in bulk. Bake in a moderately hot oven (375 degrees) 25 to 30 minutes for coffee cakes. In a hot oven (400 to 450 degrees) 15 to 20 minutes for rolls. Change of temperature depends on size of rolls.

DUTCH APPLE CAKE

(May 27, 1938)
2 egg yolks
1 cup milk or water
2 tblsp. shortening
2 cups flour
3 teas. baking powder
1 teas. salt
2 tblsp. sugar

Topping: 1 teas. mace or cinnamon
3 apples
1/2 cup sugar
Set regulator for 375 degrees and light oven. Mix egg yolks with milk or water. Cut shortening into sifted dry ingredients and add to egg yolks with milk or water. Cut shortening into sifted dry ingredients and add to egg mixture; mix

into a soft dough. Pour into shallow pan. Pare, core and cut apples into eighths, place evenly on top of dough and sprinkle with sugar mixed with spice. Bake 30 to 35 minutes.

CARROTS DEL MONICA

(May 28, 1938)
6 medium sized carrots
Carrot water
Milk
4 tblsp. butter
1 tblsp. sugar or honey
2 tblsp. flour
2 egg yolks
Few grains pepper
1 teas. salt
1/2 cup Parmesan cheese
1/2 cup dry bread crumbs

Wash and slice carrots thin; barely cover with boiling water; cook 10 minutes after boiling point is reached. Drain, reserving liquid, add enough milk to make 1 1/2 cups. Mix butter, sugar, flour, and egg yolks; stir in carrot water and milk; cook over low flame 5 minutes, stirring until mixture begins to thicken. Place carrots in casserole; sprinkle with salt, pepper and cheese; pour over hot sauce; sprinkle with bread crumbs. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) 30 minutes.
