America's First Seeing Eye Dog Goes East To Die
"Buddy," America's first "Seeing Eye" dog, returned early this week by plane to Morristown, N. J., headquarters of the great Seeing Eye organization, to die.
"Buddy," who made a public appearance in Highland Park with his master, Morris J. Frank, last February, was in a very serious condition when he was placed aboard a United Airlines plane at the Municipal airport, in Chicago, Monday.
A month ago, this famed dog, led his master to Chicago on business, performing his duty with efficiency, until two weeks ago when he developed a cancerous growth in the right hind leg.
Both of the animal's legs became paralyzed as the growth spread. Specialists were consulted, but they said that "Buddy" could never recover. Frank, who is vice president of the "Seeing Eye" organization, decided to take him home.
It is not customary for airline companies to carry dogs, but due to the fact that the Seeing Eye dogs are so carefully trained to lie quietly at their master's feet, Mr. W. A. Patterson of the United made an exception to the rules. He also stated that in the future "any Seeing Eye dog will be welcome to any United plane."
"Buddy" will not be destroyed, but will be given opiates to relieve his pain until he dies.

Denies Theft In Highwood; Offers To Make Restitution
Although he denied vehemently that he stole \$160 worth of clothing from a Highwood store last February, a Chicago youth in Highwood police court last week offered to make "restitution."
Complying with the agreement with his attorneys, Police Magistrate Joseph Ariano accepted the \$160 from the defendant, Theodore Wisniewski, 24, of 941 Windsor avenue, and fined him \$100 for disorderly conduct.
Wisniewski was arrested on May 3 in a clothing store at 542 Waukegan avenue, Highwood, operated by Paul Pekar. The owner's wife spotted him as one of two youths who visited the establishment last February.
A checkup of stock several hours after their departure revealed that seven men's suits were missing.
Because the evidence that Wisniewski and his missing companion, identified as Kenneth Wilson, 24, of Detroit, "lifted" the clothing was circumstantial, Highwood officials agreed to a "settlement" plus a disorderly conduct fine.
When Wisniewski was seized last week, Wilson, who accompanied him on the previous visit to Highwood, escaped by automobile. A warrant has been issued for him.
Mrs. Wisniewski paid the \$260 to Magistrate Ariano and her husband was released.

Pedigreed Shorthorns Will Be Auctioned At Thomas E. Wilson Farm
Cattle breeders from all the agricultural states in the union and from several provinces in Canada will be present at the annual auction of pedigreed shorthorns at Thomas E. Wilson's Edellyn Farms next Monday afternoon. Forty head of cattle will be sold.
The breeders will be the guests of Mr. Wilson for luncheon, and the auction begins directly afterwards. Many of the men, however, arrive early in the morning, and some come as early as the night before, for the purpose of inspecting the cattle.
With many of the cattle imported from Scotland, home of the Shorthorns, and comprising numerous head of American-bred national and international first prize winners, Mr. Wilson's herd is regarded generally as the finest in the country.

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE CHURCHES
"Ancient and Modern Necromancy, alias Mesmerism and Hypnotism, Denounced," was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, May 29. The Golden Text was, "Take heed that no man deceive you" (Matt. 24:4).
Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "But on the whole armour of God, that ye may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil. For we wrestle not against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness in high places" (Ephesians 6:11, 12).
The Lesson-Sermon also included the following passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "Evil thoughts and aims reach no farther and do no more harm than one's belief permits. Evil thoughts, lusts, and malicious purposes cannot go forth, like wandering pollen, from one human mind to another, finding unsuspected lodgment, if virtue and truth build a strong defence" (p. 284).

Lay Cornerstone Of New "Moody" Building During Conference
Dr. Will H. Houghton, president of the Moody Bible Institute of Chicago, announces a May Bible conference to be held Monday to Friday, May 23 to 27, inclusive, in connection with the cornerstone laying of the new Administration building now being erected on North La-Salle street, just north of Chicago avenue. Speaking of the building, Dr. Houghton said, "The new Administration building will make possible the bringing together of widely scattered administrative activities, thus making for efficiency and economy of operation, and also aid greatly in making it possible for us to care for an increased student body. The building will provide for classrooms, offices for faculty and staff members, Alumni Association rooms, ample post office facilities, an enlarged library, and reception halls. The three upper floors are assigned to radio station WMBI for offices, studios, and control rooms."
