### Flag Day, June 14th

#### The American Flag

The American flag is the symbol of the brotherhood of man—it stands for courage, for chivalry, for generosity and honor. To bear the Star Spangled Banner is an honor, to own one is a sacred trust, for it is an emblem of freedom, equality and justice for all.

In its general form, adopted June 14, 1777, our flag is older than any of those of Europe except Denmark, which has been in use since 1219.

The flag is composed of thirteen stripes, alternated red and white—standing for the thirteen original colonies, and a field of blue with forty-eight stars, one for each state in the union.

In the language of the flag, red stands for courage, white for purity and blue for fidelity and truth.

The church flag of the navy, a blue cross on a white field, is the only flag that ever flies above the stars and stripes and then only during divine service.

The president, as commander-in-chief of the army and navy, has his special flag, the coat of arms of the United States on a blue field, with thirteen stars in the form of a star in a circular field above the eagle.

When the national or state or other flags fly together the national flag should be placed at the right.

#### Pledge of Allegiance To Our Flag

I pledge allegiance to my flag, and to the country for which it stands—one nation, indivisible, with liberay and justice for all.

### Safety Measures Instituted Backed By Local Committee

The Highland Park Citizens Safety Committee announces that they will have a meeting of all the representatives on Tuesday evening, June 14, at the Public Library.

During the past two weeks, a number of developments have taken place in Highland Park which will tend to make motoring more safe. Throughout the community where the roadways have worn away from the catch basin, there has been the problem of these obstructions standing out in the street. A number of citizens have complained about them and some have even suffered damage to their tires. These catch basins have been painted by the city which enables the motorists to see them more clearly. In some of the older sections of the city the old fashioned horse block is being taken down and new ones built. These horse blocks were built many years ago and the erosion of the soil has caused the street to work back and leave the horse block almost standing out in the street.

The Highland Park Citizens Safety Committee has recommended to the city the purchase of additional traffic signs. Traffic signs are needed on Green Bay road opposite the Northmoor Country Club and also on the narrow section where the street is slippery during wet weather. The Highland Park Citizens Safety Committee heartily approves of the suggestion of enlarging our police force. For many months we have realized that Highland Park needs to do this. The community has been growing and it is only natural that the police force should be enlarged so that they can cope with the law-enforcement needs.
