Board of Supervisors Applies For W.P.A. Grant For Hospital

Bonds to be issued by the board of supervisors for the construction of Lake County tuberculosis sanitarium will be "nothing more than tax anticipation warrants" if a PWA grant of \$180,000 is obtained from the federal government, the board was informed by Assistant States Attorney Okel S. Fuqua.

The board authorized Chairman Daniel Hentges to file an application for the PWA grant of approximately 45 per cent of the estimate of the cost of the hospital building and city limits.
