GINGERBREAD
(June 6, 1938)

- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1/2 teas. salt
- 1 teas. cinnamon
- 1 teas. ginger
- 1 teas. nutmeg
- 1/2 teas. cloves
- 1 cup molasses
- 1 teas. soda
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 1/2 cups flour (all purpose)
- 1 teas. baking powder
- 1 cup boiling coffee

Light oven and set regulator at 350 degrees. Combine shortening, salt, spices, and soda. Add sugar gradually and cream until light and fluffy. Add egg and beat thoroughly. Blend in molasses. Sift flour with baking powder 3 times, add to creamed mixture, blending well. Add boiling coffee and beat until smooth. Pour batter into a 10x10x2 inch greased pan. Bake 50 to 60 minutes.

SWEDISH TEA RING
(June 7, 1938)

- 1 cup milk
- 1/2 cup butter
- 1 teas. salt
- 2 cakes compressed yeast
- 1/2 cup lukewarm water
- 2 eggs
- 4 1/2 cups flour
- 1/2 cup sugar

Scald milk and pour over butter, sugar and salt. Crumble yeast into the luke warm water to dissolve. Cool milk to lukewarm and add yeast. Add well beaten eggs. Beat in flour to make a soft dough. Turn out on a floured board and knead until smooth. Form into a ball and placed in a greased bowl. Cover and let rise until double in bulk. When light, shape into a rectangular sheet about 1/4 inch thick. Brush with melted butter and sprinkle with brown sugar and cinnamon. Roll jelly roll fashion and shape into a ring. Place on a greased baking sheet and cut with scissors at one inch intervals, almost through ring. Turn slices slightly. Cover and let rise until double in bulk. Bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees) 25 to 30 minutes. While warm, ice with white frosting and sprinkle with chopped nuts.

JELLIED ROSE BOUILLON
(June 8, 1938)

- 2 tblsp. gelatin
- 1/2 cup cold water
- Salt and pepper
- 2 cups clear broth
- 2 cups clear tomato juice

Soak plain gelatin in cold water. Heat broth and tomato juice to boiling point. Remove from flame, season to taste, add gelatin and stir until dissolved. If necessary add a small amount of red vegetable coloring. Pour into shallow pan and chill. Break up with fork and serve in bouillon cups. Garnish with parsley and wedge shaped lemon slices.

INDIVIDUAL COFFEE CAKES
(June 9, 1938)

- 2 cups flour
- 1/2 teas. salt
- 4 tblsp. sugar
- 3 teas. baking powder
- 4 tblsp. shortening
- 1 egg
- 1/2 cup milk

Light oven and set regulator at 350 degrees. Sift dry ingredients together; mix in shortening; add beaten egg to milk, and add to dry ingredients to make a soft dough. Divide dough into six long, narrow pieces and roll each piece very long and thin with the hands. Spread with soft butter. Cut each piece in two and beginning in the center twist the two pieces together and bring ends around to form a cres-

cent. Put into a greased pan and sprinkle with chopped nuts. Bake in a hot oven for 15 to 20 minutes. While hot brush over with thin icing. Made with 1/2 cup confectioners sugar, moistened with 1 tblsp. hot water. Serve warm.

PEANUT BUTTER COOKIES
(June 10, 1938)

- 1 cup butter
- 1/2 cup peanut butter
- 1/2 cup white sugar
- 1 1/2 cups flour
- 1/2 teas. salt
- 1/2 teas. soda
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 teas. baking powder

Cream butter and peanut butter together. Add white and brown sugar. Cream well. Add remaining dry ingredients sifted together. Shape into balls the size of a walnut and flatten crisscross with a fork. Bake in hot oven (400 degrees) for 12 to 15 minutes.

FRIED CHICKEN
(June 11, 1938)

- 2 chickens
- Salt and pepper
- 1/2 cup butter or
- 1/2 cup other shortening

Wash, remove pin feathers and singe chickens. Cut into pieces, salt and pepper to taste, and let stand 1/2 hour. Melt butter, and when hot, but not smoking, add chicken. Brown on each side, reduce flame and simmer gently until well cooked. This will take 20 to 30 minutes. Serve with Chantilly potatoes.

Chantilly Potatoes

- 6 potatoes
- Salt
- Pepper
- 2 tblsp. butter
- 1/2 cup cheese
- 1/2 cup whipping cream

Boil potatoes, mash, season and add butter. Put into buttered casserole; sprinkle with grated cheese and spread whipped cream on top. Place in moderate oven (350 degrees) for about 15 minutes or until delicately browned.

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Highland Park Y.W. Spread International Cooperation Wings

The Highland Park Y.W.C.A. has spread its "practical international co-operation" wings recently by sending a set of posters to the Y.W.C.A. in Buenos Aires, South America, and a set of folders describing various activities of the local branch to a Y.W.C.A. secretary in London.

Part of the publicity exhibit which went to the national convention in Columbus, Ohio, this spring was a collection of posters which had been used by the local Y.W.C.A. A former secretary of the Buenos Aires association saw the posters and coveted them for the South American branch. She asked if she might send them to Buenos Aires, and permission was granted by Mrs. Everett Fontaine, former publicity chairman of the Y.W.C.A. here who had prepared the exhibit.

The posters included one for a mothers club minstrel show made by Mrs. Dorothy Gardiner; one for a Mexican chili supper made by Nick Frio, who taught a poster class at the Y. W. C. A. last year; one for a talk on Guatemala drawn by Mrs. Fontaine; and a bus tour poster made by Martha Olson. The posters were made on such inexpensive and ingenious materials as brown wrapping paper, backs of suit boxes and shirt cardboard.

When Mrs. Theodore Osborne, past president of the Highland Park Y.W.C.A., was in London recently, she conferred with various Y.W.C.A. officials there. One of the secretaries was particularly interested in the program being carried out here and requested a set of folders telling of the activities of the local Y.W.C.A. 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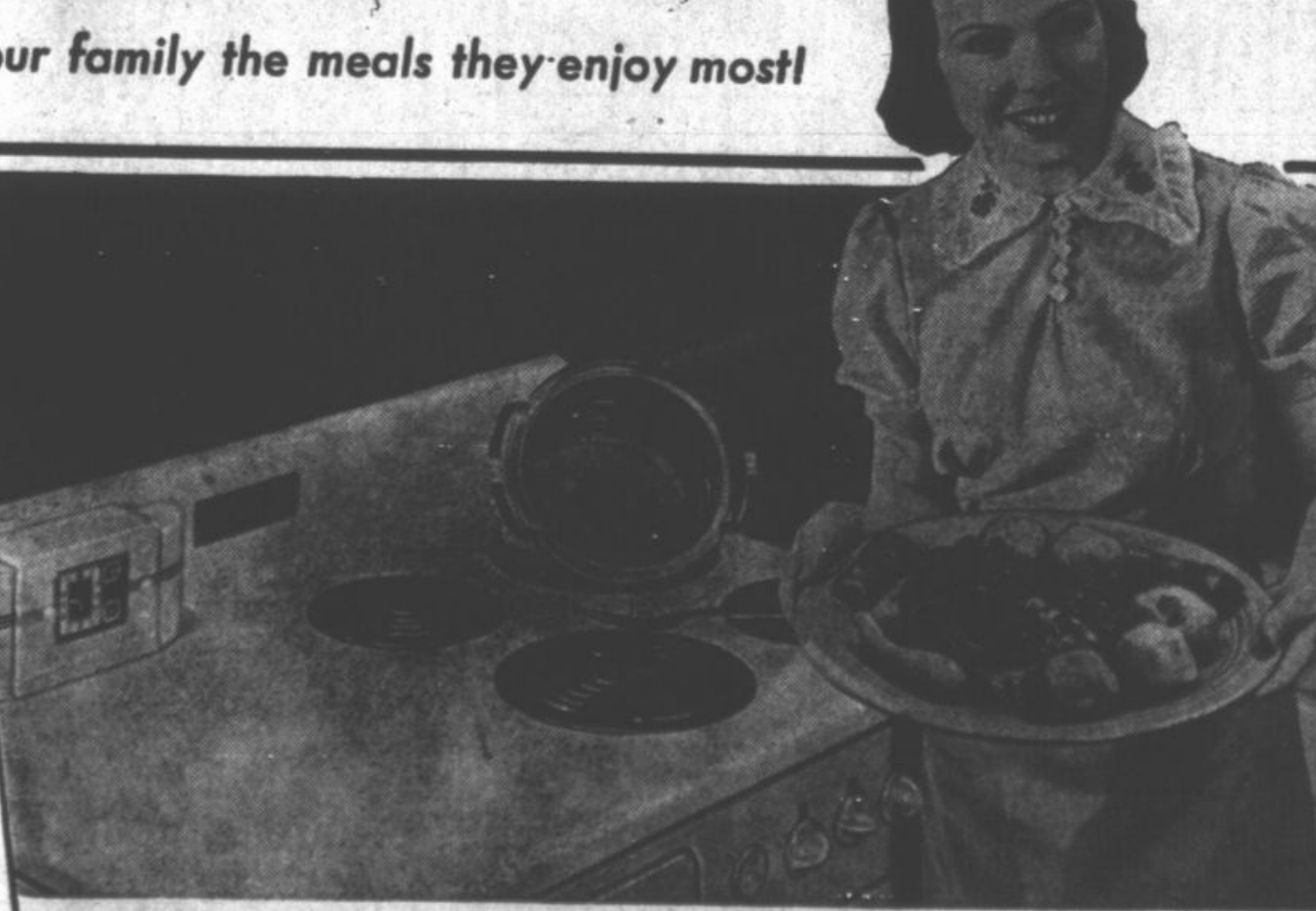
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
