GINGERBREAD (June 6, 1938) cup shortenting teas, cinnamon teas, ginger teas, cloves cup molasses egg 21/2 cups flour (all purpose) teas. baking powder cup boiling coffee

Light oven and set regulator at 350 degrees. Combine shortening, salt, spices, and soda. Add sugar gradually and cream until light and fluffy. Add egg and beat thoroughly. Blend in molasses. Sift flour with baking powder 3 times, add to creamed mixture, blending well. Add Pour batter into a 10x10x2 inch greased pan. Bake 50 to 60 minutes.

1 egg ½ cup mlik Light oven and set regulator at 350 degrees. Sift dry ingredients together; mix in shortening; add beaten egg to milk, and add to dry ingredients to make a soft dough. Divide dough into six long, narrow pieces and roll each piece very long and thin with the hands. Spread with soft butter. Cut each piece in two and beginning in the center twist the two pieces together and bring ends around to form a cres-

cent. Put into a greased pan and sprinkle with chopped nuts. Bake in a hot oven for 15 to 20 minutes. While hot brush over with thin icing. Made with 1/2 cup confectioners sugar, moistened with 1 tblsp. hot water. Serve warm.

PEANUT BUTTER COOKIES (June 10, 1938) 1/2 cup peanut butter cup brown sugar (Peter Pan) teas, baking 1/2 cup white sugar 4 cups flour

Cream butter and peanut butter together. Add white and brown sugar. Cream well. Add remaining dry ingredients sifted together. Shape into balls the size of a walnut and flatten crisscross with a boiling coffee and beat until smooth. fork. Bake in hot oven (400 degrees) for 12 to 15 minutes.
