

Deerfield To Have Three Big Carnivals During the Summer

Three carnivals are scheduled for Deerfield for the summer. The first carnival is to be held on July 2, 3, and 4, Saturday, Sunday, and Monday at the Holy Cross church. The next is to be on July 22, 23, and 24, Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, under the sponsorship of the Village Board to help clear the municipal indebtedness. The third carnival is to be given by the Deerfield post, of the American Legion Auxiliary on August 13, 14 and 15.

Holy Cross Carnival
The annual event of the Holy Cross church, the first of the three, will have Murphy Day, again on Sunday when Chicagoand Murphys will help the local parish observe the day. Dinner will be served from 12 noon to 7 p.m. Last year 1200 dinners were served and a larger crowd is expected this year. Fire works displays will be arranged for Sunday and Monday.

All committees for the carnival met on Tuesday evening to complete plans. Many useful and expensive prizes will be given away as added attractions.

Detailed announcements of the two other carnivals will be made later.

Mrs. C. O. Christman Aged Resident Is Buried Saturday

Mary Elizabeth Christman was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Hesline, and she and a twin sister were born on January 23rd, 1865, in Newton county, Mississippi. She departed from this life early Thursday morning, June 16th, 1938. She attained the age of 73 years, 4 months and 24 days. Mrs. Christman came from a pioneer family whose spirit was rugged and courageous, a spirit which she herself inherited and used in conquering her many difficulties in life. Her parents came to this country from Liverpool, England, in a sail boat and were on water for a period of 3 months and 20 days. They were on the verge of perishing because of a lack of a sufficient supply of food and water, yet they persisted and pressed on until they reached the shores of our great country.

After coming to this land they trekked cross country until they reached Mississippi, where they settled to establish their home and rear their family. When Mrs. Christman was but 9 months of age she lost her mother through death and when she was 5 years of age her father also passed on. She, her twin sister and brother were then given a home with an uncle and aunt, who later moved from Mississippi to Louisiana by means of an ox covered wagon which took them a period of over 2 months. After living in Louisiana for a number of years Miss Heslin met Mr. Charles O. Christman with whom she united in marriage in the year 1884. The happiness of this young couple soon was blighted when this young bride was afflicted with a serious siege of rheumatic fever which gradually developed into an arthritic condition which finally resulted in her being an invalid. For 53 years she suffered this serious handicap. But beyond this body which was afflicted there was a spirit of rare beauty. Mrs. Christman's faith gave to her an inner strength and fortitude which made it possible for her not only to endure but really triumph over suffering and pain.

Her radiant and cheerful person-

ality helped many a person to tread upon a pathway of happiness because they learned to know her. She often cheered and encouraged those who really came to bring comfort and cheer to her. She with her husband and children moved to various localities of our nation with the hope that it might benefit her health, but it was of no avail. For a period of time they lived in Texas, later they moved to Hot Springs, Ark., where they lived 4 years, and in 1911 they came to Highland Park. Mr. Christman passed on June 2, 1933.

Mrs. Christman became a Christian early in life and united with the Baptist church and she remained a member of the same throughout her entire lifetime. Although she was not able to attend the public worship services of the community, she maintained a keen interest in the activities of all the churches and was greatly concerned about the advancement of God's kingdom. She had much satisfac-

tion in listening to various services that came to her by radio. She also was very much interested in the work of the WCTU, which was to have met in her home on the day of her passing.

On Friday evening, June 10, Mrs. Christman suffered a cerebral hemorrhage which resulted in paralysis and an unconscious condition until the time of her death. Two chil-

dren remain to cherish the memory of their mother. They are Aura of Michigan City, Indiana, and Kupper of Oakland, Calif., who was not able to attend the services Saturday. One child, Fred, preceded his mother in death in 1912. She also leaves 8 grandchildren and many friends throughout various parts of the nation. It is of interest that her twin sister passed on less than

a month ago, and experience that proved to be a heavy loss to her. Funeral services were in charge of Seguin and Logan. Rev. H. F. Siemsen officiated. Interment took place in Mooney's cemetery.
