

Arlington Park To Open Monday For 30 Day Meeting

America's ranking trainers—the top salaried men of the paddocks who dominate the country's stake races—will gather here for Arlington Park's 30-days meeting which opens next Monday, June 27. They will come from the swank eastern meetings in New York, Delaware and New England, from Detroit and Kentucky, to meet the acers of the western training corps at Chicago's No. 1 racing grounds.

The men who prepare the prize horses for the millionaire sportsmen, those who make famous a one or two horse stable, and all those with ranking in between, are among them. They will come from the north and the south and from the Atlantic seaboard to the Pacific slope. A good sized smattering will move to Arlington Heights from Crete.

Noted trainers such as "Sunny Jim" Fitzsimmons, conditioner of Belair Stud, Wheatley Stable and the Ogden Phipps string; J. W. "Big Jim" Healy, the genial Celt, trainer for the extensive John Hay stable; George Conway, who handles War Admiral land other thoroughbreds of Samuel D. Riddle's establishment will saddle their charges some time during the 30-days of racing.

Then too, Earl Sande, trainer of Stagehand and The Chief, star 3-year-olds of Col. Maxwell Howard, has notified officials of the jockey club that he plans to campaign during the meeting. Charles S. Howard's Stable, headed by Seabiscuit, War Admiral's "arch-enemy" for championship honors, trained by Tom Smith, will be there under charge of the conditioner.

Dick Handlen, trainer of Dauber, William du Pont's winner of the Pimlico, will also supervise training activities of his boss' string at the north course.

From the Coast, Ben Jones, trainer of Larwin, Kentucky Derby winner, plans to head east to Arlington. Larwin has been named to go in the \$30,000 added Arlington Classic on July 23. The Classic is the leading summer season stake and attracts the best in the land.

Emerson F. Woodward's chief of thoroughbreds, John J. Flanagan, will bring the Valdina string over from Crete. Others coming from that track will be: Ben Creech, Jack Hodgins, who handles the western division of Millsdale Stable; Paul Kelley, Clarence E. Davison, A. G. Woodman, conditioner of Leo Marks' LeMar Stock Farm; A. G. Tarn, S. B. Ott, Howard Wells, the veteran Roscoe, Goose, who handles John Marsch's stable, and a score or more of others.

Heading the powerful western stables will be Frank Kearns, trainer of Warren Wright's Calumet Farm; Bob McGarvey, of Mrs. Ethel V. Mars' Milky Way Farm; J. J. Greelet, trainer for Patrick Nash's Shandon Farm; William Booth of Mrs. Emil Denemark's racing farm, and D. A. Headley, nephew of owner Hal Price Headley.

The rest and wash rooms there will be a locker room and shower room. Here on the ground floor, too, will be an individual exercise room. This room probably will be fitted out with mats, rowing machine, stall bars, chest weights, medicine balls, punching bag and other individual exercise equipment. Here small conditioning classes can be held, and individuals may work out by themselves if they so wish.

Then there is planned a squash court (singles) and a handball court. These rooms will be available for a small rental fee. The heating plant is on this floor.

Also, if present plans can be carried out, there will be space under the gymnasium for future rooms and activities. A rifle range could be installed in this space, among other things. However, the development of the space under the gymnasium cannot be planned now on account of lack of funds.

The Community House architects are: Raymond W. Flinn, W. D. Mann and John S. Van Bergen.

The men and women who are helping to plan for your future Community Center want to get for Highland Park the best there is in such a center. They are definitely planning with an eye for the future. Space has been provided for future growth; rooms have been planned for multi-use; needless and costly corridors have been largely done away with, and the location of the site has been carefully studied.
