As you know Community Service of Highland Park (Inc.) conducts community recreation and education during the fall, winter and spring of the year. Its board of directors, thirty in number, supervises the use of Community Service income. This income is spent for Highwood Square recreational purposes.

So that all may know the scope and type of activities that are conducted during the year the following report of activities is presented. To make these activities a success thanks are due to the Adult Education Council, the High school and Grade school boards for their fine cooperation in these community events.

Ravinia Village House Badminton-This is the oldest badminton class in the community. It conducts a yearly tournament, and sends players to championship tournaments. Men and women both play. Gene Kern is the class president and Howard Copp is the director. It met for 90 sessions with 2593 present.
