

VOICE of COOKERY

(Editor's Note): Listen to the "Peekers in the Pantry" over station WCFL (970 Kilocycles) every morning, 11 to 11:30 a.m. except Sunday, for further food acts and interesting talks on foods.

For the benefit of our new readers, these recipes are all tried and tested. Each dish is prepared on the date under the title, except on Saturday, during the broadcast.

SLICKERS (June 20th, 1938) 1 1/2 cups flour, 1/2 teas. baking powder, 1/2 teas. salt, 1/2 cup butter, 1 cake cream cheese (8 oz), 1 tbs. milk, 2 tbs. sugar, 1/2 teas. cinnamon

Light gas oven and set regulator at moderately hot (375 degrees). Sift dry ingredients; cut in butter and cheese; add milk and cut until well mixed. Roll out to 1-8 to 1-4 inch thickness; cut in rectangles 3 inches by 3 inches and sprinkle with sugar and cinnamon. Bake in a moderately hot oven 15 to 20 min.

CHOCOLATE FUDGE CAKE (June 21st, 1938) 4 sq. chocolate, 1/2 cup shortening, 1/2 cup boiling water, 1/2 cup sugar

2 eggs, 1 teas. vanilla, 3 cups pastry flour, 1/2 teas. salt, 2 teas. baking powder, 1 teas. soda, 1 cup buttermilk or sour milk. Light gas oven and set regulator at moderately hot (375 degrees). Cook chocolate and water until it makes a thick paste; then let cool. Cream shortening; add sugar gradually and cream again. Add unbeaten eggs, one at a time, beating thoroughly after each addition.

APPLE SAUCE CAKE (June 22nd, 1938) 1 cup butter, 2 cups sugar, 2 eggs (optional), 1/2 teas. salt, 2 teas. cinnamon, 1 teas. cloves, 1 cup chopped nut meats, 2 cups raisins, 2 teas. baking soda, 2 cups unsweetened apple sauce, 1 teas. vanilla, 1/2 cup flour. Light gas oven and set regulator

at 375 degrees. Cream butter and sugar. Add eggs if used, and cream again. Sift salt, spices and flour; into this stir the chopped nut meats and raisins and mix thoroughly. Beat the soda into the unsweetened apple sauce until sauce is foamy; stir into butter and sugar mixture. Add dry ingredients and vanilla. Makes a large sheet cake or three 9-inch layers. Bake layers 25 to 30 minutes or in loaf pan in a moderate oven (350 degrees) for 45 to 50 minutes.

GOLDEN SPONGE LOAF (June 23rd, 1938) 1 1/2 cups cake flour, 1/2 teas. baking powder, 1/2 teas. salt, 1 teas. grated lemon rind, 1 cup plus 2 tbs. sugar, 9 egg yolks, beaten until thick and lemon colored, 6 tbs. cold water. Sift flour once, measure and add baking powder and salt and sift together three times. Add lemon rind, then sugar gradually to beaten egg yolks, beating with a rotary egg beater after each addition until thick and light. Fold in half of flour thoroughly. Add half the water and fold until blended. Then fold in remaining flour and lastly remaining water. Bake in ungreased oblong pan, about 15x9x2 inches, in a moderate oven (350 degrees) 30 minutes or until done.

CARAMEL NUT PIE (June 24th, 1938) 2 tbs. butter, 1/2 cup milk, 1 cup sugar, 1/2 teas. salt, 1/2 tbs. flour, 1/2 tbs. cornstarch, 1/2 teas. salt, 2 eggs, 1 teas. vanilla, 1/2 cup walnuts. Put butter in frying pan. When melted stir in 1/2 cup sugar and caramelize it. Add hot milk grad-

ually, stirring constantly until blended. Sift remaining 1/2 cup sugar with flour, cornstarch and salt; slowly stir into first mixture and cook over a low flame 10 minutes. Add slightly beaten yolks and cook 1 min. longer. Remove from fire. Add vanilla and chopped nuts, and when cool turn into a cold baked pie shell. Cover with meringue and place in slow oven (300 degrees) to brown.

BAKED TENDERLOIN OF BEEF (June 25th, 1938) 1 beef tenderloin, 2 slices salt pork. Wipe tenderloin; dredge with flour; place in baking pan and lay strips of salt pork over top. Bake in a moderately slow oven (325 degrees) allowing 15 to 18 minutes per pound. Garnish with glazed pineapple slices.
