New June Books

'We Too Are the People,' by Louise V. Armstrong. It will come as a surprise and a shock to many readers that a book such as this could be written about the United States. In the northern Michigan county the Federal Emergency Relief Administration uncovered a community whose desperate straits had gone on for years and to whom the national disaster had only given a final crushing blow.

'Middle Age Is What You Make It,' by Boris Sokoloff. Besides acquainting the reader with the latest medical knowledge of man's bodily machinery, Dr. Sokoloff lays bare the acidity and alkaline myths and the cathartics habit, attacks age-discrimination vigorously, and recommends useful hobbies and co-operation with one's own physician in order to achieve a system of living suited to one's individual make-up.

'The History of Motion Pictures,' by Maurice Bardeche. The motion picture is important not only because it is the new art-form of modern times, but also because of its tremendous influence on society. 'The History of Motion Pictures' contains material that is essential to an understanding of this influence, and indicating through its lucid and suggestive analysis of the film's progress, the future possibilities of the art.

'Farewell to Sport,' by Paul Gallico. Paul Gallico for fourteen years' was one of America's ace

sports-writers. He saw them all—the stars and the hams, the immortal and the phonies. Two years ago he quit the game and now he gives us this startling farewell—a vivid picture of the great moneyed sports during the post-war period 1920-35.

**Summer Schedules Provide North Shore with Fast Air Service**

Fast air service between North Shore communities and Washington and other eastern cities is provided in new summer schedules announced by R. F. Ahrens, district traffic manager of United Air Lines. Passengers boarding a United Air Lines plane at the Curtiss Airport in Glenview at 8:15 a.m. reach Washington at 2:27 p.m. and Boston at 4:49 p.m. Arrival in New York is at 1:44 p.m. The short flight between Glenview and the Chicago Municipal Airport reduces by an hour and a half the travel between the North Shore and principal eastern cities.

The flight from the Municipal Airport to the east is made in de luxe Mainliner transports, the same type that is being used on United's Sunday afternoon sightseeing cruises from Glenview.

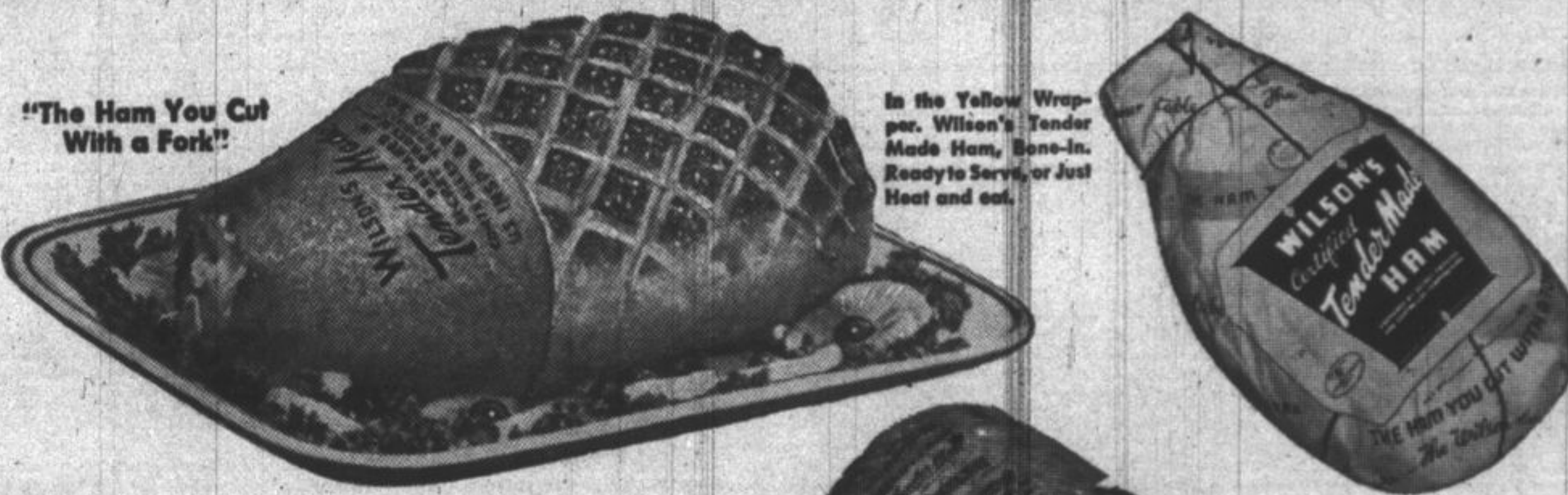
